The Annual meeting of the Tryon Dairying Company, was held in the Creamery on March 7th. There was a very good attendance of both shareholders and patrons. Mr. C. J. Cooke, was present and gave a splendid address on the dairy work, emphasizing the importance of every patron and dairyman on the island having his herd tested by the tuberculin test. The statement of the Company, was lower than last year, owing to the dry season and lower prices. The total pounds of butter manipulated was 155,936 pounds, valued at \$66,119.84 average price realized for the butter was 42.4 cents. The net value of butterfat to patrons was 45.97 cents. Last year the company gave \$75.00 as prizes for calves, exhibited by the children of the district at the Tryon School Fair. The directors for the incoming year are: Messrs. Job Inman; George Wood; Gordon Dawson; Joseph Noonan; Harold Howatt; Wilbur Trainor; George H. Callbeck. Mr. C. E. Gamble being re-elected as Secretary and butter maker.
