MR. R. H. HEGAN IN PORT ARTHUR.—Port Arthur News chronicle of December 2nd says: R. H. Hegan, inspector of the Bank of Nova Scotia, with headquarters at Toronto, arrived in the city today from a tour of western Canada as far as the Pacific coast, where he has been for the past four months on his annual inspection of the Bank's branches. Mr. Hegan is particularly well pleased with business conditions in Western Canada. There is a feeling of confidence throughout the West and notes for several years. This feeling is, for the most part, fostered by the fine crop of 1925 and the general improvement in industry and other lines of business. Mr. Hegan said Mr. Hegan is in Port Arthur and Port William inspecting the local ranches. It may be mentioned that Mr. Hegan is expected in Charlottetown shortly on a visit to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Hegan.

OFF FOR FRANCE.—Major T. J. Rogers left on Saturday morning for France in connection with the river fox industry. From the Rogers ranches this year 85 pairs of foxes were shipped in charge of Jack Aylward and Thomas Fuller of this city. The former will return to the island, and the latter will remain in France for a year. The foxes were a magnificent lot of animals, all being secured by George Trickett of the American Fox State, making an average of 3 1/2 percent. A large number took the super-advance award, which means 95 points or better, all being registered in the Canadian Live Stock Register. Last year 32 pairs of foxes were sent from the Rogers ranches to France to Mr. Louis Martens, who was so delighted with the high quality of the animals that he gave a much larger order this fall. Before the end of the year it is expected that about 300 pairs of foxes will be shipped from this widely famed group of Rogers ranches to different countries.

STOCK MARKET

(Canadian Press.) MONTREAL, Dec. 8.—Dominion Livestock report.—There were 140 cattle, 234 lambs, 595 hogs and 65 calves for sale on the market this morning. Few common cows what was left over from Friday and fresh receipts of cattle were made up almost entirely of canners and cutters sold from \$2 to \$10.50. Some quality square brought \$10 and \$10.50 and two or three good values were picked out at \$11.25. Best lambs offered today brought \$12.25 and poor lots upwards to \$11.50. General quotation for good quality hogs in mixed lots were \$13. to \$13.10 and selects \$13.75. Sows sold for \$10.25.

CHRISTMAS MAILING. IN MEMORIAM MARTIN ROCHE. RESOLUTION OF CONDOLENCE

The Postmaster General has issued a Christmas message to the public soliciting their co-operation in the early posting of Christmas mail. He asks that all should obey that oft-repeated slogan—"Ship early, mail early." It would be well to remind those who intend to mail Christmas cards or parcels to British Columbia that they should do so during the present week or not later than the 15th. Any who have not yet mailed their parcels for overseas friends should also do so this week so as to connect with the Steamer "METAGAMA" from St. John on the 11th or with the Steamers "Megantic" from Halifax on the 13th, and "Ascania" from Halifax on the 14th. It is also important to remember that all parcels going to the United States, are sent to Bangor for Customs and there is always delay at that point for examination of every parcel, so that friends who are sending parcels to the United States should not fail to mail them at the earliest possible moment.

Friends of Martin Roche were much shocked to learn of the fatal accident, which occurred to him on Saturday, when he was shingling the roof of his house at 23 Prescott Street, Waban, Mass. The gutter gave away, letting Mr. Roche fall to the ground. He passed away later from the effects of the fall. He leaves a wife, Mrs. Priscilla Roche, two daughters, Miss Elizabeth and Miss Catherine Roche of Watertown and two sons, Edward and Henry Roche of Waltham and Henry Roche of New York. Funeral service was held on Tuesday with High Mass of Requiem at St. Patrick's Church at 10 a. m. Mr. Roche was born in Prince Edward Island, being a son of Mr. Edward Roche, Johnston's River, and had lived in this town about 13 years. 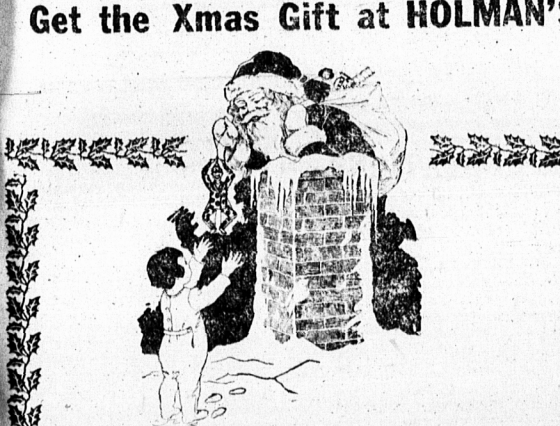
