Successful Red Cross First Aid School

A very successful First Aid School was conducted by the Red Cross at Prince of Wales College during the Christmas holidays. Three separate courses—standard, advanced and instructors, ran concurrently with a total enrollment of 27. Most of these candidates were school teachers and already many have first aid classes started in their own communities. As usual, splendid co-operation was received from both medical doctors and the Department of Education. Lectures were given by Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, Dr. Gordon Lea, Dr. W. H. Soper, Dr. Temple Hooper and Dr. J. A. MacLean. Mr. E. W. Shaw, Director of Education, spoke on the "Fundamentals of Teaching" and used as an introduction to his talk a film "Tips for Teachers". The National Film board representatives assisted greatly in these courses both by supplying films and showing many of the Red Cross film strips and slides. Mrs. N. D. MacLean and Miss Mabel Matheson were among first aid instructors who gave lectures and demonstrations, as well as members of the Red Cross staff. The examinations were conducted on Saturday, January 3rd, by Dr. A. J. Murchison, Mr. Gordon Rice and Mr. Edward MacPhail, both from the Department of Education. Mrs. N. D. MacLean together with members of the Red Cross staff. Mrs. E. M. Blame Oiler For Fire On Funeral Ship

HALIFAX, Jan. 17. — (CP) — A green oiler's unfamiliarity with oil gadgets in the engine room of the ill-fated United States Army transport Connolly was the cause of the fire which destroyed the ship.

This was a charge made here today by Anthony Denselovsky, a Russian-American from Middle Island, N.Y., an engine-room hand in the Connolly. Denselovsky said that a preliminary investigation had showed that the green oiler thought he had locked one of the big strainers on one of the oil feed lines that carry fuel to the ship's giant burners.

When his relief—Floyd Sellers of Whitefield, N.C.—look over Sellers switched the pressure from one feed line to the other with the unlocked strainer cap. The cap flew off and the hot oil spurted into the air, splashing over Sellers and igniting when it sprayed on the big burners under the boilers.

A snorter of hot flames enveloped the engine room and Sellers ran screaming to safety. Fortunately he was able to beat out the burning oil on his hands and face. He quickly tore off his flaming garments and wrapped himself in a blanket. It was this blanket that probably saved him from serious frost-bite when he spent the long 12 hours in the open boat waiting for rescue by the Union Victory. He was still wrapped in the warm gray blanket when he stepped ashore here this morning into a waiting ambulance.

There was one Canadian in the Connolly. He was Raymond Rye, of Norwegian origin, who lived in Vancouver until 1943 and who uses a Canadian passport. Rye, an engine room wiper, was in the same lifeboat with Capt. Ben A. Bortelman, master of the vessel, and the prospect of remaining in those exposed boats in the bitter cold. But when we got close to the ship, she blazed up to the sky and we retreated. We knew it was hopeless.

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British Black Market Operators Lose Nerve

LONDON, Jan. 17.—(CP)—The Bank of England statement indicated today that Britain's black market operators have lost their nerve. Before the First World War the Bank issued notes up to certain limits on a fiduciary basis, that is against its securities. Thereafter notes had to be covered by gold. Since 1928 notes have been issued on government security. The present issue of £1,400,000,000 compared with £300,000,000 before the war.
