Gen. Currie's Successor

OTTAWA August 18.—Following upon the resignation of Gen. Sir Arthur Currie, Inspector General of the Canadian Forces and Chief Military Counsellor to assume his appointment as principal of McGill University, war organization and re-arrangement of duties have been effected at Militia Headquarters. New appointments to the posts of General Officers Commanding Military Districts number three with headquarters at Kingston and twelve, headquarters at Regina have also been made. In the re-organization at Militia Headquarters Major General S.E. Burstall, K.C.B., K.C.M.G., A.D.C., becomes Inspector General with the rank of Lieutenant General in the Canadian Militia. The Militia Council will consist of Major General J.H. MacBrien, C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O., who becomes Chief of the General Staff; Major General E.C. Ashton, C.M.G., who succeeds General Burstall as Quartermaster General, Major General J.S. Elmsley, C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O., who relinquishes the post of Officer Commanding Military District three to become Adjutant General at Headquarters, Major General E.W. B. Morrison, G.C.M.G., C.B., D.S.O., who is appointed to the post of Master General of the Ordnance, Lieut.-Col. H.D. G. Crerar, D.S.O., attached to Headquarters Staff as Chief Staff Officer Artillery.
