

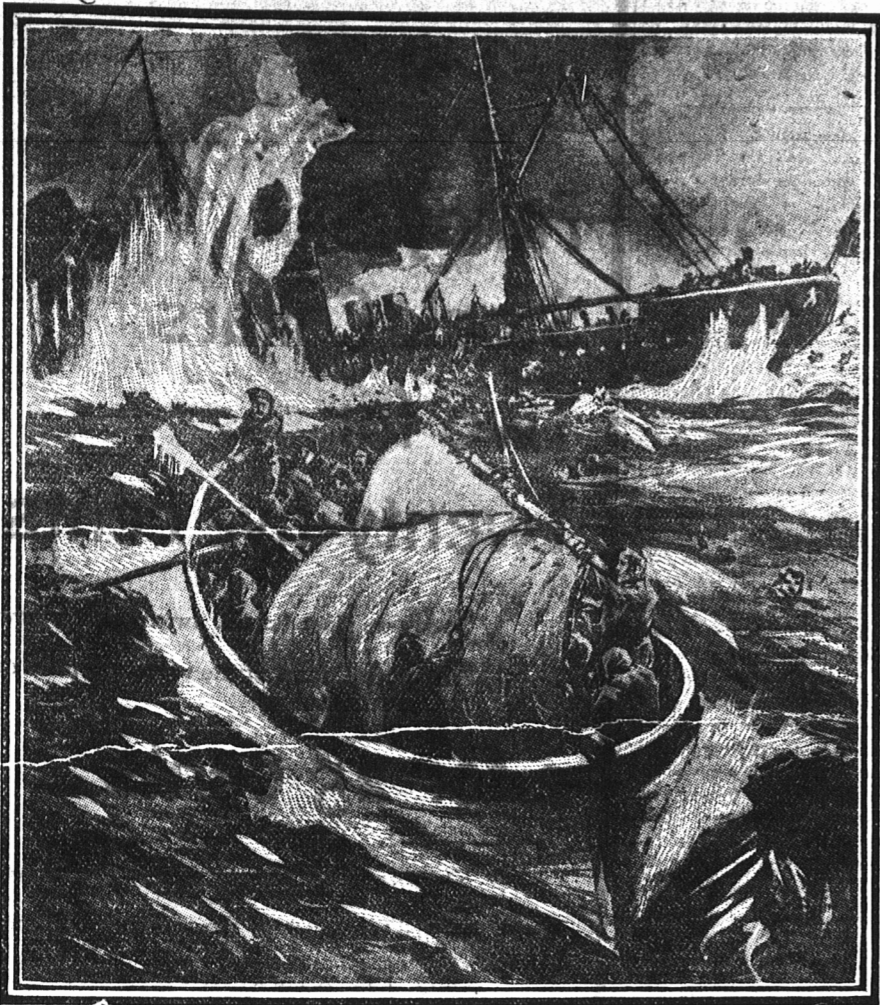

THE CZAR'S EMPIRE.

The Russian Empire embraces six-sixths of the land surface of the world. It is more than fifty times larger than Japan, and has a total area of 8,650,000 square miles. Half of Europe and the whole of Northern Asia are included within its boundaries. It has a greater continuous area than any other nation in the world. The Arctic Ocean lies to its north and the Pacific to its east. On the south lie Manchuria and Korea, over which Russia is now battling with Japan; China, Afghanistan, Persia, Turkey, both in Asia and Europe, and Roumania. On the west Russia adjoins Austria-Hungary, Germany, the Baltic Sea and Sweden.

There are four distinct parts to the Russian Empire which mark its growth and development. These are: (1) Russia in Europe, including Poland and the Grand Duchy of Finland; (2) the Caucasus and Transcaucasia; (3) Siberia; and (4) Russian Central Asia. The extreme southern latitude of the Empire is the same as that of Charleston, S. C., and its northernmost parallel passes through the unexplored regions of Northern Greenland. European Russia has an area of 2,095,610 square miles, about thirteen times greater than that of Japan.

Stories of Lord Kelvin. The recent election of Lord Kelvin to the Chancellorship of Glasgow University has put into renewed circulation a number of anecdotes about the great scientist. Most Kelvin stories which obtain in Glasgow are founded upon the occasional inability of the great man who lived in logarithms to bring his mind to a childish sum. Kelvin himself tells how on his blackboard he once made two and two five, and hearing the chuckles of his delighted class, altered it hastily to three. He was, however, once heard to say, in his characteristic slow way, with his beautiful use of the soft Irish r, "Seven times nine, Mr. Macfarlane, are a hundred and what? (Pause). But, no; seven times nine cannot be a hundred and anything. Mr. Macfarlane, for the square of a hundred is ten." It is also told of him that, walking one day with a friend in Largs, he noticed that it had begun to rain. He questioned his friend closely as to where his coat and umbrella were, and having satisfied himself that his friend had not these articles with him, he said, "Well, in that case, doctor, we will walk back beneath this belt of trees, for the rain will not percolate leaves," doctor, for twenty minutes."

Advantages of "skipping." Dr. Bond of Gloucester, England, has lately put forth a pamphlet on the advantages to be derived from "skipping" as a systematic exercise; a pamphlet the first mention of which is perhaps likely to provoke a smile, but which deserves, nevertheless, to be seriously considered. Dr. Bond intends to express only the methods of springing over a revolving rope which found much favor with the young people of fifty years ago, although, if we are not mistaken, they have fallen into at least comparative disuse in the present day. Dr. Bond strongly recommends it to be practiced for a few minutes on first rising from bed, or after a bath, and speaks from personal experience of its efficacy in giving vigor to the muscles and tone to the circulation, even in a subject no longer in the heyday of youth. He especially recommends it in all the cases of weak heart.

NEW WORLD'S BIKE RECORD.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, August 6.—Two new world's bike records have been established on the Salt Lake City saucer track by W. E. Saelens, of Utah, (professional), and E. B. Heagren, of California, (amateur). Saelens rode ten miles in a record of 24:29.3, lowering the record held by W. A. Vaughan, of Europe and the whole of North America, by five seconds. Heagren established a new amateur record for the two mile competition race riding the distance in 4:06.25 seconds or 6:25 seconds under the former record.
