SOME COSTLY MISTAKES

Earle Grey's plan to create a national park ornamented with a statue of Peace on the Plains of Abraham meets with general approval among the people and press of all races and creeds. But strangely enough it is found that the Government had years ago leased a considerable area, including the spot on which Wolfe fell, to the Ross Rifle Company which now has its large factory in operation there. The spirit of war is in possession and must be evicted if we know not what cost before Earl Grey's peace-promoting scheme can be carried out.

When Ottawa first became the capital of Canada a vast sum was expended in the erection of the Parliament and Departmental buildings. For the Governor General's residence the home of a successful lumberman across the Rideau River was bought. It has been improved, and rebuilt and had additions made to it since under successive governments at the cost of many hundreds of thousands of dollars. Enough has been expended upon it already to have built the palace of a king, but still more costly and extensive changes are now pending. Truly Rideau Hall has been a costly mistake.

Different in kind but related to these is the location of the Grand Trunk Railway hotel in Major's Hill Park at Ottawa. This beautiful park which closely adjoins the principal public buildings of Canada at the capital has been improved and ornamented at large cost to the nation. It was held too sacred to be utilised for needed national buildings and sites for several of these have been purchased in scattered places about the city. But the Grand Trunk Railway for payment of \$100,000 is granted a site in this special national preserve on which to erect an hotel. It sounds almost incredible. Probably a future generation may correct the blunder, but if so it will be at a staggering cost.

A further instance of costly mistakes was the Quebec bridge. It was to have the longest span of any bridge structure on earth, yet the wise American engineer who planned it concluded its frame might be safely made less strong than the bridges of less span before erected elsewhere on the cantilever plan. We all know the result. The superstructure fell when half completed, carrying down four score men to their death, causing a loss of millions of dollars and delaying for years the completion of the work. Awfully costly was this mistake of the designers and builders, and on the government, which had guaranteed the company's bonds, the loss seems likely to fall in the end.

Again there is fear of a Zulu uprising. The warriors are preparing for battle by the slaughter of girls and smearing their bodies with infant's blood to render themselves immune against bullets. They are said to be better armed and drilled than ever before. They outnumber the whites in Natal tenfold and are most redoubtable fighters. The white man's burden is heavy on the shoulders of John Bull, and the time has not yet come when he can lay it down.

THE CHANGEABLE WINTER.

In this latitude we seldom fail to have a good share of cold weather. If as during the present winter, the early months are unusually mild, we generally pay up for it in February and March, and perhaps later on. So far February has proved stormy and cold, with heavy snowstorms in central and western Canada, and there is doubtless more of the same sort to follow. It may be mentioned in passing that today is the anniversary of the memorable Cold Friday of 1861, forty-seven years ago, perhaps the most trying winter day in the memory of living persons.

The Cold Friday of the Maritime Provinces was known as the cold Thursday in Ontario, which Province it visited one day earlier. A north-west wind of hurricane violence sufficient to break down many trees, was accompanied by unprecedented cold, which, in Sussex, New Brunswick, where the writer then lived, froze to death hundreds of the woodpecker tribe and other winter birds in their forest home. This combination of intense cold and high wind is exceedingly rare, as the thermometer usually reaches its lowest register in calm weather.

One theory for explaining our changing winter seasons is the shifting of the polar cap. It is always cold at the poles of the earth, the frigid atmosphere covering the rounded polar regions as a wig covers the head of a bald-headed man, but with the opposite effect. The theory is that this cap is from year to year about equally large and equally cold, but that the prevailing winds one year may push it over toward northern Europe and northern Asia, and at another time may push it over to our side of the pole, giving severe cold in northern America. By this theory there has been this year a midwinter shift of the polar cap in our direction. If so we must put on more coal.

NATURALISATION OF ALIENS.

This subject becomes of far-reaching importance in view of the hundreds of thousands of foreign immigrants flocking to Canada. It is claimed that Canada, or any other British colony cannot fully naturalise any of these. True, we can make the alien a British citizen within the Dominion and so long as he remains there. We can and do, after three years residence, administer the oath of allegiance and give him the right to vote, to be elected to and sit in Parliament, and to hold any office in the land. But all these qualifications drop from him the moment he crosses the boundary line or passes beyond the three mile limit off our coast.

The alien naturalised in Canada, if he goes to the British Isles or to a British colony abroad is not there qualified as a British subject. Nor can he legally obtain a passport to travel on the European continent as a British subject. By so much less is his status of citizenship than that of another who is Canadian born or British born. In a word the foreigner who is naturalised in Canada and afterwards leaves the Dominion is a man without a country. This is a serious matter, and grows more serious from year to year. Sir Wilfrid some time ago promised to bring the matter before the imperial government to have Canadian naturalisation placed on a more favorable basis; but it seems not to have been yet effected.

What causes the gripe? It is said to be a microbe, but as this microbe has been abroad in the world for hundreds of years why does he get about his work only during the winter season? The gripe microbe, like all the other disease-creating germs, proves troublesome when conditions favor his attack. In winter most people eat a good deal more than in summer, taking less, exercise also, and so taxing their digestive system; sit in the house or shop and so get much less fresh air than in milder weather. These are the conditions that the grip microbe delights in. Ventilation in the home, in churches and halls is not sufficiently attended to. These are among the reasons why gripe, scarlet fever, smallpox and other diseases are so prevalent in the cold season.
