**INSTITUTE WORK.**—A great many ladies in and around Cornwall attended the December meeting of the Cornwall-York Institute. Already this society has carried out some improvements for the good of the community and is making splendid progress with the work undertaken. The subject on Monday was Christmas cookery, on which many good tested recipes were exchanged. A novel idea introduced was the display of inexpensive Christmas gifts brought by different members, who described the making of the various articles. The social side of the meeting was emphasized by the women of the Cornwall section entertaining those from York Point with an enjoyable supper, which was very much appreciated. The singing of the Island Hymn brought the meeting to a close.

**NOVEL ENTERTAINMENT.**—In the Meadowbank school on Tuesday the members of the Women's Institute were very much interested in a spelling match which reflected great credit on both scholars and teacher. Then for an opening ode the children sang the Island Hymn, in a very pleasing manner after which they were dismissed to accommodate the Institute meeting. The evening shows marked results of the efforts of the Institute, who assisted materially in the renovation of the interior of the building. After business matters were disposed of the supervisor spoke on the topic "What other Institutes are Doing." This was shown the broad field of subjects before the women of the province, who by the formation of Institutes are working for the improvement of the home and the upbuilding of the community. The Great Interest was shown in the discussion which advanced some helpful ideas for future work.

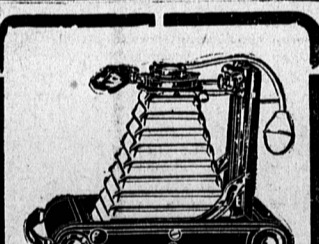

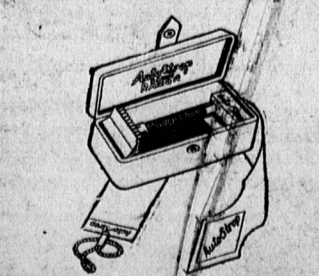

## AN INSURANCE POLICY FOR \$100,000,000

**MONTREAL, Dec. 4.**—The largest single insurance deal in the world ever consummated is at present being put through by a Canadian concern. The policy is for upwards of \$100,000,000; the property being insured is valued at between \$12,000,000 and \$15,000,000, and belongs to the Canadian Pacific Railway. Five big insurance syndicates, among them the largest company of the kind in the British empire, are interested in the deal.

Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, president of the C. P. R., said yesterday that the deal would probably be completed by today.
