## British Agents Among Dead In Chinese Revolt

### Town In Chinese Turkestan Literally Wiped Out In Fierce Uprising.

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MOSCOW, March 16.—Several members of the British Consulate staff tonight were reported killed or wounded and 2,000 Uyghurs, comprising most of the civil population of the town of Kashgar in Sinkiang, Chinese Turkestan, were massacred in fierce fighting between rebellious Tungan natives and forces of the newly-proclaimed "independent government."

This information was contained in reports from Tashkent.

Kashgar itself was virtually sacked during the combat, which took place when Tungan detachments attacked the town and rescued a garrison of Tungan, which was besieged in a fortress there by independent government troops.

## Dies From Frost Bites

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) THURRO, N. S. March 16.—Miss Lila McNutt, aged recluse of Salmon River, found almost frozen to death in her isolated little home late last month, died in hospital today after surgeons had amputated both feet above the ankles. Death was attributed to shock and weakness from frostbite.

The woman was found by her brother-in-law early one morning, almost unconscious. She was in bed but there was no fire in the cabin and both feet were frozen. The man said there was plenty of wood near the stove but the fire had been permitted to burn out during the night.

## DILLINGER'S NEGRO AID SHOT DOWN

### Shoots It Out With Michigan Authorities — Dillinger Reported Heading For Ont.

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) PORT HURON, Mich., March 16.—John Dillinger's negro aide in his sensational wooden-gun escape from an Indiana jail last night—the victim of his own boasting and the guns of four St. Clair County officers—and the trail of the fugitive "Cop killer" again was hot.

Herbert Youngblood, who was facing a murder charge when he accompanied Dillinger in a break from the Crown Point, Ind., jail on March 3, died this afternoon a few hours after he had shot it out with Sheriff William L. Van Antwerp and three deputies. They had gone in search of a negro who boasted of a successful jail break, and cornered Youngblood in a small store.

## GERMANY MAY REJOIN LEAGUE

(Associated Press)—CHANCELLOR Adolf Hitler was represented as an apostle of peace, not war, in an arms memorandum recently sent to Paris and made public here tonight.

The Chancellor asserted that Germany has no thought of weakening the post-war Locarno Pact and has never doubted its validity at any time.

In the note, Hitler expressed the conviction that an agreement with France on armaments is possible and said that when the disarmament problem has been settled, Germany will discuss her relations with the League of Nations.

The German Government made no direct promise in the note that it will return to the League but it did hint rather broadly that it might do so if the League statutes are so modified as to make the League, in Germany's opinion, an association designed to carry out the Treaty of Versailles.

## Attorney General Probes Liberal Law Enforcement With Astonishing Results

### Insincerity Of Opposition Anti - R. C. M. P. Campaign Scored By Hon. H. F. MacPhee, Who Fires Final Gun In Draft Address Debate.

Liberal claims to moral superiority in enforcement of the Prohibition Act received a rude jolt in the Legislature yesterday, to the accompaniment of almost continuous rounds of applause from Conservative benches, as Hon. H. F. MacPhee, Attorney General, replied to Opposition attacks on the reputation of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and the record of the MacMillan Government with regard to law enforcement.

Speeches in the course of the late Les Government ratiated, and one even emerged into the light of day to confront the Liberal representative from Rustico, when Mr. MacPhee cited the case of a convicted bootlegger who formerly was one of the squad of "strict temperance men" employed as Liberal prohibition officers.

The Attorney General followed Mr. Thane A. Campbell and was the final speaker in the Draft Address debate.

The difficulty in dealing with such of the Opposition criticism regarding the enforcement of the Prohibition law, Mr. MacPhee explained, has been the vague and general nature of the statements made. He was particularly surprised to hear the sweeping statements made by the ex-Minister of Public Works (Mr. McIntyre). "If I had not read the speech of my hon. friend, and had not known him and seen him first-hand when he was delivering his remarks," he said, "I would have felt that he was allied with those American gangsters we hear so much about, because their attitude towards the police of their country is just about on a par with the attitude expressed by my hon. friend towards the Royal Canadian Mounted Police." (Applause.)

The charge had been made by the ex-Minister, said Mr. MacPhee, that the Mounted Police were "absolutely worthless."

Mr. McIntyre: "So far as Prohibition enforcement is concerned."

Mr. MacPhee: "You say that now, and I am glad that my hon. friend has qualified it; because I am afraid he did not qualify it when he spoke. The statement he then made was that the Mounted Police were 'absolutely worthless.' The only qualification he made was that they were 'nearly per cent inefficient.' I am very glad the hon. member now admits that it was only as to the enforcement of one particular law of this Province that he was speaking."

It is believed a new precedent has been set by the expedition with which the reports have been tabled this year immediately after the conclusion of the Draft Address debate, and with ample time afforded the Opposition for study before the Budget debate.

"As Attorney General of the Province," continued Mr. MacPhee, "it is of course my duty to consult with the Mounted Police, and make use of them. I wish to tell this House quite candidly and frankly that I find the Police of great assistance in the enforcement of all the laws of the Province. I get the keenest co-operation from them. I find they are an alert force, an experienced force; that they know how to do things; that matters can be safely entrusted to them; that in the preparation of criminal cases they are of the greatest assistance to the Crown. And if the hon. member who has just taken his seat (Mr. Campbell) ever returns to the position he once occupied as Attorney General, I have no hesitation in predicting he will be prepared to make the same statement as to the efficiency and co-operation of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police."

## PASS SUCCESSION DUTY ACT

FREDERICTON, N. B., March 16.—(Canadian Press)—The proposed new Succession Duty Act for New Brunswick passed the committee of the whole House today and was recommended to the Legislature with slight amendments.

In explaining the various changes from the present Act, Hon. W. H. Harrison, K. C., Attorney-General, said that the rates of duties now imposed were not being altered.
