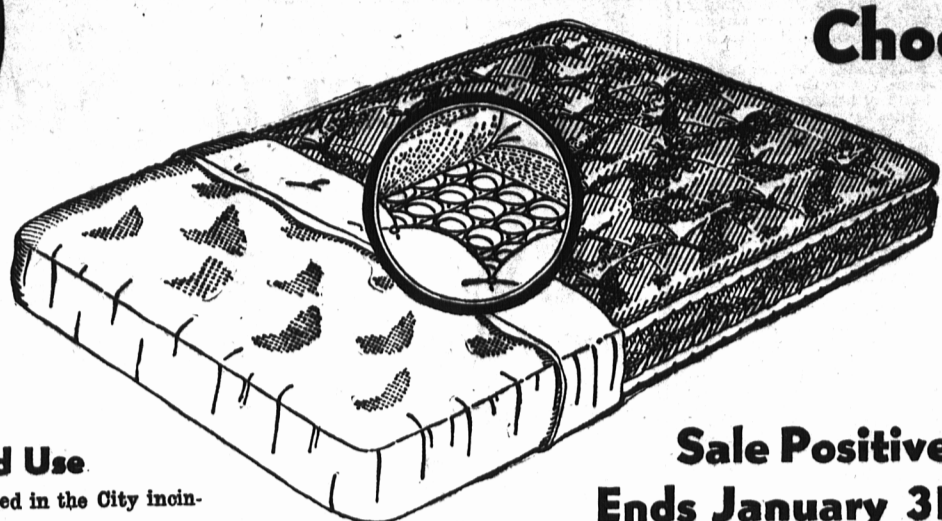

**Potato Gift Acknowledged**

Mr. Park Francis Victoria, R.R.I. has received the following letter from the West which will be interesting reading.

SHOONOWAN, Sask., December 16, 1934.

Parker Francis, Victoria, P.E.I. Dear Friend,—Received the spuds, three sacks of them, and found your note in one, one of the other sacks came from Albany, P.E.I., but couldn't make out the name. This is the first year since the drought that we have failed to grow enough garden stuff for our own use. We had some spuds, but not many. 250 acres of farm land and no spuds would look very funny down there wouldn't it.

The grass hoppers were what raised heck with us last year. Conditions are not so bad right in my vicinity as in some parts of the West where they are bad enough. The drought has brought on the crisis though it would have come anyway due to the economic position the farmer was placed in—the exploiters have taken millions out of the country, and when their slaves are on the verge of starvation in spite of the fact of the millions which they have produced in recent years, these same farmers elsewhere for aid to the 'tough farmers of the west.

Farmers in this dried out area have produced more value per capital than any other place in the world, where did the money go? Farmers haven't got it because they're living on relief. The drought started here in 1930 and has continued ever since. Though only in '30 we had a complete failure here, in some sections of the province they haven't grown a thing since. Some are following the path of last resistance, and passing on via the rope or a shot in the head. Our in past two weeks not far from here. They are mostly farmers who were at one time fairly well to do, but some found themselves at bottom again, one was found hanging in his granary, the others were shot. Brother shoots Brother and nosekeeper them self. Many go insane, in some sections miles and miles of vacant farms, buildings all going to ruin. Some awful dust storms a few years ago; in fact last spring was bad enough. I have seen houses with the earth blown up in piles nearly to the top of the windows. A dust storm is no fun, nearly as bad as a blizzard in the winter.

In spite of all this I like the country out here, you can stand on a hill in clear weather and see for miles. It gets in your blood, and with all the troubles we have here, I would hate to leave. I came from Ontario so I know what bush country is.

I am married and we have a family of five children, two going to school, two and a half miles. In closing I thank you for the spuds, and hope that in the event of P.E.I. something going on the bum, that we will be in a position to render the necessary assistance.
