There are left to mourn four brothers and two sisters: Ernest in British Columbia, Devena and Laura in Maine, and Milton, Allie and Arthur at home.

A large number of valuable gifts testified to the popularity of bride and groom. At the conclusion of the ceremony Mr. and Mrs. Blake received congratulations after which a sumptuous supper was partaken of. The evening was spent in singing, music and recitation. Mr. and Mrs. Blake left on the 25th for Charlottetown.

The Guardian has been furnished with the following clipping from the Douglas County, Colorado Record. It refers to an Islander, Hon. Alfred Stewart, who is a brother of W. S. Stewart, K. C., of Charlottetown. The Record says: "The return of Hon. Alfred Stewart to his constituents and his home, after his most successful service to his county and his state as a representative in the 16th Legislative Assembly, whose session is now at an end, should be the signal for general congratulations, not only on the part of members of his party, but of every citizen of Douglas County, regardless of Party affiliation. Up to the time of Mr. Stewart's election to the fifteenth Legislative assembly, two years ago, the total appropriations for Douglas County during the fourteen previous assemblies in exact figures amounted to \$21,000. During the session of the fifteenth assembly Mr. Stewart secured for his county appropriations amounting to \$3,000. During the session just closed, through the efforts of Mr. Stewart, \$17,700 in appropriations were secured. This leaves Mr. Stewart's work in two sessions worth only \$5,250 less than the united efforts of all the legislators who preceded him. All honor and praise to Hon. Alfred Stewart for his loyalty to constituents, for the consistency of his course and the earnestness of his work, which has accomplished so much for Douglas County."

An old and well esteemed member of the community in Belfast recently passed away when on the 23rd day of March 1907 at Ocean View Lot 88, Donald McLeod breathed his last in his ninety-second year. Though attaining such unusually advanced age, yet having a robust constitution, always industriously employed, he was daily able to be about his ordinary duties until last winter when the infirmities of age and infirmity of the season brought on his final illness, which was but brief. Death was no terror to him, for he was enabled from the heart to say "I know that my Redeemer liveth" and with firm faith and hopeful peaceably fell asleep. Mr. McLeod was born at Glasgow in June 1815, when that and the surrounding locality were in pioneering days and he was one of the very few who in later years could by personal knowledge remember and describe the progress, privations and incidents of those early times. Having a fair degree of intelligence, hospitable and sociable in disposition, he will be greatly missed by surviving friends, relatives, and acquaintances of whom there are a large number. For many years he had been a consistent member of Belfast congregation. Three sons predeceased him some years ago viz, Donald at St. Domingo, W. L. George who died at home, and the late Rev. John McLeod, Vanhook Hill, Ont. whose useful life was untimely cut off by a fatal accident. An aged widow, one son and three daughters survive him, also several grand children and a sister, Mrs. Buchanan, who is two years his senior. They all cherish his memory as that of a loving husband, brother, father and friend. Com.

We want a fair deal and it will pay the authority to consider our wishes and their own interests in these matters. We want the tunnel, and nothing but the tunnel."
