THE GRAND JURY DISCHARGED

Their Report on the Doherty Case

The Severe Remarks of the Chief Justice on Their Finding—Cases Before the Court.

At half past five last evening the Grand Jury reported.

Regarding the Doherty matter they reported as follows:

We, the Grand Jurors having had under consideration the case of Patrick Doherty, the person convicted under the Prohibition Act to which their attention was called in the charge of the Hon. the Chief Justice having heard and considered the statements of all the parties, whose evidence they believe could throw any light upon the matter beg to report that while there was an apparent irregularity yet the full consideration of the facts and circumstances of the case as detailed in the evidence they are unable to charge any individual as it appears to them there were extenuating circumstances why the said Patrick Doherty was not apprehended whilst temporarily in the said Province.

The Chief Justice sternly discussed the Jury's report. He could not see how 12, 45, or 17 intelligent men such as those before him could arrive at such a decision. He pointed out that some one was guilty in the Doherty matter for the law says "any one guilty of an indictable offence who omits to do any act prescribed by the statutes of Canada or the Provinces." He (the Chief Justice) could not see how law is to be administered after this in the Province. We may as well close the courts if this state of things is to prevail. To gloss over such a flagrant violation of law by "extenuating circumstances" may satisfy them but it did not by any means satisfy him or the remainder of the Court.

After the report had been further discussed by the Chief Justice, and the Foreman and others had made some remarks, the Chief Justice discharged the jury in the following words:

"Well gentlemen, in discharging you I must thank you for your attendance during the past two days in the Court. I would not however be doing justice to this court or to the community if I should thank you for the manner in which you have performed your duties. The efforts will be far reaching and very detrimental to the welfare of the entire community. You are discharged.

ALMOST WAS A FATAL ACCIDENT

That Occurred at York Yesterday Morning

Miss Lucretia Lawson Struck by Train as She was Crossing the Railway Track.

A fatal accident was narrowly averted at York yesterday morning. The eastern train was just coming into the station when Lucretia Lawson, an elderly lady who resides with her sister and brother at York and keeps the Post office there started to cross the track in front of the incoming train to her father who was on the opposite side.

The train was only a short distance off and she appeared for a moment to hesitate. The next instant she again started but she did not get across in time to avoid the engine which was rapidly coming down the track.

The engine struck her on the head and she was hurled some distance to the platform.

The injured lady was picked up in a semi-unconscious condition. The medical examination by Dr Warburton, who was summoned from the city, showed that she was badly shaken up, was bruised on her head and arm and that a small bone was broken in her arm. Last evening she was resting easily and hopes for recovery are good.

Miss Lawson is a sister of D. A. Lawson station agent at Hunter River, Thos Lawson, St. Avars and Mrs. McLean, City.

CAMP CLIPPINGS.

The P. E. I. Light Horse have their Muster Parade this morning at 8.15 a. m. on their parade ground.

The drill while more difficult than in former years is all the more interesting. Already the men are buckling down to work and give promise of good showing on inspection day.

The commandant, after Muster Parade yesterday in welcoming the men to camp pointed out that good behaviour and efficiency were requisite to entitle non-commissioned officers and men to the extra rates of pay. The appearance of the units in dress and bearing was noteworthy, he expected the behavior to be in keeping. He impressed on them the fact that the Town Police had jurisdiction over them as over any citizens. Any offender in addition to whatever penalty was imposed by the civil authorities would afterwards be dealt with by the Military.

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SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATES DOWN

For the Year Closing Today, Work Already Done

Some Tariff Changes—Two Lads Drowned in St. Maurice River—Notable Christening in London.

OTTAWA, June 29.—The supplementary estimates for the current year ending June 30th were presented to Parliament last night. They show a total of \$1,865,639. Of this amount \$1,568,975 is charged to consolidated fund, \$190,315 to capital and \$106,348 for unprovided items.

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THE TEACHERS' CONVENTIONS

Were Held in Prince and King's Counties

A Very Large Attendance at Each Yesterday—Enjoyable as well as Educational Sessions.

The 38th Convention of the Western Teachers' Association opened yesterday in Foresters' Hall, Summerside at 10 a. m. W. J. McMillan, president, presiding.

After routine business the president gave the opening address giving a review of the association since the start, and afterwards referring to educational matters at present. According to Inspector McIntyre's report, work in the primary schools of the country seems to be on the down grade during the past year. Increases of teachers' salaries were recommended to come directly from the people, particularly as our province is more lightly taxed than other parts of Canada. Teachers were recommended not to engage in any district without a supplement as well as to refrain from underbidding each other as had been formerly the custom. Reference was made to the Rhodes Scholarship and to W. E. Cameron, the successful candidate who goes to Oxford University. The address was in every way creditable to Mr. McMillan, president of the Association.

The first session of The Eastern Teachers' Association opened yesterday morning very auspiciously. President Jas. D. McLeod occupied the chair.

The hall was artistically decorated for the occasion with maps, flags, charts and pictures which the flag of the E. T. A. floated to the breeze.
