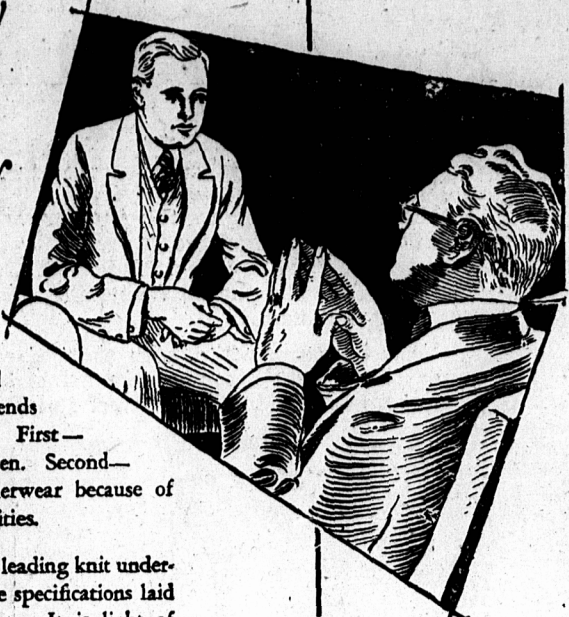

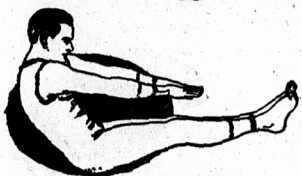

NEWSY FARM NOTES

IODINE FOR SHEEP

It is well known to swine-breeders that iodine or some of its compounds is very effective when administered to brood sows, in correcting that condition which produces hairless and under-developed litters. Whether its administration to breeding ewes is a valuable practice, has not yet been fully determined; but experiments now being carried on at the Fredericton, N.B., Experimental Station, would seem to indicate that it has some effect.

The iodized salt, which was fed to one-half of the ewes at the Station from fall until spring, was made by drying out fifty pounds of common salt and then sprinkling it with two ounces of potassium iodide, dissolved in water. The other half of the ewes were given untreated salt.

In his report for last year, the Superintendent of the Station states that there was little, if any, difference between the two lots of lambs the first year; but in the second year those ewes treated to iodized salt produced stronger lambs than did the ewes which were given only plain salt. The experiment is being continued this winter.

THE HAND

There's a small machine, but grand. It's a human being's hand. And its four little fingers and a thumb.

And there is no part of the machinery of the body in which man is so manifestly superior to other animals as in this. Observe the hand as it works or plays. How simple it is—merely a thumb and four fingers joined to the body of the hand; but then, the thumb may be made to meet the tip of any finger, or of all conjointly; and each finger can move independently of the others. Thus the hand can take hold of different things in different ways—whether he handle a pen, a whip, a rope, a string or an axe.

But its simplicity is superficial. In reality, when examined by the anatomist, it is found to be a more complicated apparatus. The "small machine" is made up of thirty-two bones, and numerous muscles and tendons. Countless nerve-fibres branch into these muscles, and messages from the brain, flowing along them something after the manner of telegraphy, cause the machine to work.

The tribe of the apes, and the opposum family, are the only groups among the lower animals which have thumbs; but in these the thumb is a feeble imitation, so to say, of that of man. In some apes it is but slightly opposable to the fingers; in others not at all; while in a few it is reduced to a mere nail-less tubercle.

Nature is fond of five; five petals to the wild rose; five limbs to the star-fish; five fingers on the hand. This number which seems to be the original basis of sub-division of all forms of terrestrial limbs, must have proved to be advantageous for some reason we cannot yet discern.

The poet, however, gets upon debatable ground when he concludes that: "There was an ape in the days that were earlier, Centuries passed and his hair grew curlier; Centuries more put a thumb on his wrist. He was a man and a Plaitivist!"

OTHER GRASSES THAN TIMOTHY

We pin our faith on Timothy and we do well; it is the best of the grasses cultivated for fodder. It has many good points; the seed is cheap, it grows well, and produces a good crop of hay the year after it is sown. It fits into the rotation easily and is easily killed by ploughing. It is, however, usually displaced by other grasses after a year or two, and there are spots in field where it does not seem to thrive. For which reason it is better to sow a mixture of grasses than to depend on Timothy alone, especially when there is to be more or less permanency about the pasture.

Red-top while not making so popular a hay as Timothy, is perhaps

second in importance. Unlike Timothy it will thrive in soils that are wet, or acid, or comparatively poor. It is shallow-rooted and strongly stoloniferous, and also produces hay or pasture the year after sowing.

Orchard Grass, known in England as "Cock's-foot grass" is a tall tufted grass good for early hay and much relished as pasture for sheep; cattle are not quite so partial to it. Its weakness is that being early it is somewhat injured by spring frosts.

Blue-grass grows throughout the Timothy region, and is also stoloniferous. It is valuable more as pasture, and takes three years to come to full development; and so is seldom sown alone. It is early and grows well in fall, but is poor in mid-summer. The Canadian Blue-grass is wiry and less desirable except for poor soils.

Tall Meadow fescue is a "bunch" grass, also requiring three years for development. It prefers good land, and being much relished by stock should be included in any mixture where pasturage is an object.

Pleads For Truth In War Statements

ST. JOHN, Nov. 12.—Pleading strongly that the children of Canada be taught the truth about the World War, so that the loyalty and confidence of the generations to come towards the British Empire, may not be weakened by untrue statements emanating from United States, Lieut.-Colonel George A. Drew challenged Canadian to keep ever verdant the sacrifices contributed by the British Empire, in an address delivered at the Armistice reunion dinner of Maritime over-seas officers held at the Admiral Beatty Hotel, last evening.

In a comparison between the American forces and the British forces in 1918, Lieut.-Colonel Drew showed from statistics that in the last great German drive the British forces captured more than 300,000 German prisoners as against less than 45,000 captured by the entire American army. From the same statistics he also showed that Britain and France supplied the American army with practically all of its ammunition and guns, while the first tank of American make landed in France after the Armistice was signed.
