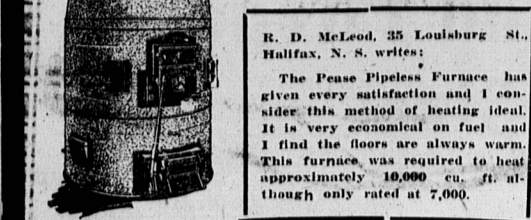

Joint Meeting Of Executives Of I. O. D. E.

A conference of the joint executives of Royal Edward Chapter, I. O. D. After luncheon, during which those present were treated to the pleasant surprise of a delightful duet sung by two members of the Springhill football team, the Regent, Mrs. J. E. B. McCreedy, extended greetings to the members of the Summerside Executive and speaking for the local Executive, expressed their pleasure in

being thus enabled to discuss matters of mutual interest in the furtherance of the schemes of the Order. She spoke of this meeting as having been the result of a suggestion from Miss Gordon, the National Educational Secretary, that the members of the two provincial chapters get together in an endeavor to side-step many of the money-making activities we seem to be increasingly involved in, and to try to get back to the fundamental activities of the Order, which are educational and patriotic in their nature, such as the Canadianization of new settlers, care of soldiers' and sailors' graves, care of monuments, etc., care of dependents of soldiers and sailors, and perhaps most especially the carrying out of the aims of the Order—the War Memorial Fund. In this connection, the Provincial Ed. Sec., Mrs. J. A. MacMillan, was called upon. Mrs. MacMillan in a very able and comprehensive report detailed and explained the work of the War Memorial Fund under its three important heads—the Bursary, which entitles eligible students to a four year university course, the Overseas Scholarship, which enabled the university graduate to carry on his or her studies in an overseas university, and the distribution of the War Memorial pictures. The speaker, after explaining her difficulty which is to secure the necessary funds for having to advertise in other provinces where there are universities in order to get in contact with students eligible for the overseas scholarship, outlined a budget for the ensuing year, based on experience of the year, and on motion by Miss Holman, seconded by Mrs. Holman, Summerside Chapter, agreed to defray their share of this budget.
