Jubilee Celebration Echoes

In Toronto—Decorations of the graves of the various men who contributed to the building of Canada in Confederation times by the Toronto Women's Liberal Association.

In Ottawa—Presentation of a bouquet of roses, in St. Barnabas Church, to a direct descendant of Senator Dickie (one of the Fathers of Confederation) this being Mrs. M. W. Maynard, wife of the rector's warden.

In East York—Selection of a Confederation Baby in the person of little Billy Brown, who was given a silver cross by the Confederation Baby is a Canadian of every generation, and his grandmother wore a silver cross for his grandfather who died in the war.

In Milton, Ont.—A four day Jubilee, and in the parade of a cab of 60 years ago, conveying Charles Jones, Milton's oldest native-born son. In York township the feature of the whole day's proceedings was the old time barbecue, which consisted of the roasting of an ox on the grounds during the afternoon, and the making of sandwiches from the meat. Every shred of meat was eagerly consumed by the 15,000 people who surged about the grounds during the evening.

In Ottawa—The reception to Margaret Anglin and Eva Gauthier. "I am proud to be a Canadian," Miss Anglin said, "and nothing could have kept me from attending the celebrations." At home in New York the distinguished dramatist known throughout nearly every country of the world is a very different personage from Ottawa's "Margaret." In New York she is the leading exponent of the drama and one of the most beloved and respected women on the stage. In Ottawa she is a daughter of an old and distinguished family whose forbears have been closely connected with the making of Canadian history. Miss Anglin was born in the Parliament Buildings as the daughter of the Speaker of the House. She received her early education there and later studied abroad.

Miss Anglin, or rather Mrs. Hull, as she really is, is to re-open shortly in Asbury Park in a delightful comedy called "April Lanes." In October with Mrs. Fiske she will revive "The Merry Wives of Windsor."


"Tell my fellow-Canadians that they should always support their Canadian artists. For a country is known more by its art than its commerce," said Miss Gauthier. Miss Gauthier came an even greater distance to attend the Jubilee than did Miss Anglin. Holidays in London attracted the singer there and it was necessary to cut short in order to be in Ottawa for the present ceremonies.

In Hamilton—The Old Folks Garden Party, held at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Mills, when invitations were extended to all who were living anywhere in Canada 60 years ago, and gold medals were presented to the oldest man and woman at the unique party.
