WILL VOTE BORDEN

Mr. E. W. B. Snyder, Former Liberal M. L. A. for Waterloo, Will Vote Against Reciprocity Because He Believes "It Will Do Canada No Good."

Berlin, Ont., September 14.—E. W. B. Snyder, ex-M. L. A., a prominent Liberal of St. Jacobs, and president of the Waterloo Manufacturing Company, of Waterloo, whose firm manufactures threshing machines, is out against reciprocity.

"I believe," he says, "that while it will not have any material effect on my particular line of business, it will on the whole, be no good for Canada."

James Scott, of Waterloo, horse and cattle buyer, and a life long Liberal, has come out strongly against reciprocity. He appeared on the platform with Mr. Weichel at Hawkesville, and in an address roundly condemned the deal as ruinous to the Canadian farmers.

BIG MEN BREAKING THROUGH THE LINES

Mr. Thomas Robertson, Head of Big Factory, Employing 600 Hands, and a George Brown Liberal, Calls for Def. at of the Government

Another bomb was thrown into the camp of the reciprocity supporters this morning when Mr. Thomas Robertson, head of the great confectionery firm of Robertson Bros. Limited, announced that on this occasion he would not support Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Mr. Robertson has been a Liberal since the days of George Brown. His gigantic factory in this city employs six hundred loyal people. It is the largest exclusively confectionery factory in the Dominion.

SENATOR JAMES McMULLEN.

Senator James McMullen, who fought and won a valiant battle in the Liberal interests through four general elections in North Wellington has decided to part company with the Government on the reciprocity issue. The announcement that such an influential and respected Liberal leader takes Mr. Borden's view on the trade agreement has caused a flurry in the Liberal camp of North Wellington, and will have a wide influence through the Dominion. The senator sent a message to Sir James Whitney, who spoke on Wednesday night at Mount Forest, that, although unable to be present he endorsed the speaker's attitude towards reciprocity and wished his cause every success.

MR. J. D. PENNINGTON.

Mr. J. D. Pennington, a loyal supporter hitherto of Liberalism in Dunlop, and through his personal qualities and his ownership of the Valley City Sealing Company, a citizen whose opinion is respected, has split from his party and come forward to combat the so-called "Reciprocity" agreement. The agreement affects Mr. Pennington's industry not a jot; he views it on the general business and national grounds, and is giving his support to the local Conservative candidate, Mr. Gordon C. Wilson.

MR. R. F. DALE OF HARRISTON

Yet another "separated" Liberal is Mr. R. F. Dale, whom the people of Harriston elected Reeve for this year. Mr. Dale has been a Liberal all his life, but regards the agreement as an attack upon the farming interests of Canada. He is therefore giving his

FLOOD OF MOLASSES IN NEW ORLEANS.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Sept. 12.—A flood of molasses swept down several streets leading from a storage warehouse last night when a tank containing about a million gallons of the Louisiana product burst with a tremendous report. A sticky morass 15 inches deep covered Market Street for nearly a mile. Thirty residents secured a year's supply by merely scooping up the syrup with buckets. The explosion was called by a wall supporting five similar tanks crumbling beneath the tremendous weight. The flow of the molasses was so swift that two boilers weighing 15 tons and near the warehouse were swept from their foundations and carried across the street. The loss is estimated at \$50,000.

or destroyed before that age. The man who tries to keep account for the good he does, never does enough good to be worth the price of the book. Character rests on morals and morals on religion, therefore religion is the principal thing. He had yet to learn of a breakthrough in character that did not come from a failure in morals. There are difficulties in religion. The believer has his doubts and fears, but the unbeliever has more doubts, more fears. He had had his own doubts. He read Genesis in character in the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. He accepted that and would hold to it till some authority goes back of the beginning. They talk of force and matter, but there must be a Designer back of it all. Wherefore the Christian begins with God. He had no controversy with evolution. Let him who would believe he was descended from the monkey—only don't connect me with your family tree. (Cheers.) The Darwinian theory is the man had developed upward. If a man had worked upward from the brute, he would think less of himself than if he believed he had within him a God-given soul. No materialistic theory can give us escape from mystery. God is God he can pervade the mystic. He cited what man had done with electricity as a most miraculous. 1900 years ago two men and two alone had the secret of wireless telegraphy and had flashed a message over thousands of miles would it not be accounted a miracle? We don't know all the laws of nature. We know little of the laws of life. Love, the foundation of the home, cannot be weighed or measured. Patriotism cannot be defined in the terms of mathematics. We do not know the mystery of the plant, the flower, the food we eat. If we must solve the mystery, before we eat we should all starve. Why then expect to solve the mystery of God? By the growth of a watermelon he illustrated the fact that we know little of the laws of growth. All the people of the world eat eggs. The man can take the egg and in a few weeks give you a chicken, one of which you could never have found there. The glass of water which he drank was just as good as if he could explain all the mystery about it. There are mysteries in the Bible, but let a man follow what he can understand in a Christian life and he would not go far wrong. There was a mystery in religion in the heart of a man when he comes to hate that which he loved before. There is a mystery in the death of One for all. It is the mystery of love. The love of the mother for her child is a mystery the mystery of love, the love of repayment. The man who has no higher motive than to save his own life, lives a little life. It is by forgetting ourselves that we can win immortality. Christ lived, and how he lived and died is a matter of consequence to every life. His purity, His love, His sinlessness, and forgiving spirit embody more for us than the Alexanders and the Caesars. This forgiveness was the hardest test for man. He forgave His enemies, even praying for them when they were putting Him to a shameful death. His disciples were scattered and put to death, refusing to deny Him, and His religion had spread through the world. How could it be explained except on the theory that he is divine? He had read in prophecy that of the increase of His Kingdom there shall be no end. Christ had earned the title Prince of Peace. Kingdoms rose and fell but His Kingdom is ever growing. Power could not give peace, money could buy it, social distinction could not attain it, worldly honor possible to the few could not bring it. But the peace of the heart was placed by Christ within the reach of the poor and the rich, even the reach of the social outcast. Who will estimate the value of the peace that comes from trust in God and reliance upon His Providence. Christ is the Prince of Peace because He brought life and immortality to light, the as-
