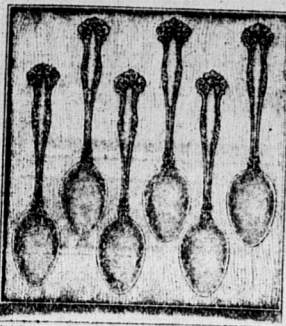

NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—Recently at
 the Metropolitan Temple, the evangeli-
 stic campaign inaugurated by the
 pastor, Dr. Hill, and under the lead-
 ership of Dr. William Spurgeon of
 London, was formally opened. At the
 morning service the auditorium was
 filled with a congregation of Christ-
 ian workers gathered from through-
 out the city. Dr. Spurgeon spoke on
 "Does Religion Pay?" The text was
 "Some New Year Meditations." At
 the close of the sermon quite a num-
 ber were received into church mem-
 bership. In the evening the temple
 was again filled to its utmost capac-
 ity. A large chorus choir of seventy-
 five voices, which will sing at all the
 services, gave special evangelistic
 music. Dr. Spurgeon's subject was,
 "Does Religion Pay?" The text was
 from Proverbs xiii:16: "Her ways are
 ways of pleasantness and all her
 paths are peace."
 Dr. Spurgeon began by referring to
 the importance of young people list-
 ening to advice given by the aged.
 Having passed through many of the
 troubles and difficulties of life, they
 were entitled to give good advice. No
 more important a question could be pre-
 sented, he said, for the first Sunday
 evening of the New Year than "Does
 Religion an Advantage?" The follow-
 ing points were taken up and discus-
 sed: "Religion, rightly understood,"
 said Dr. Spurgeon, "was never in-
 tended to deprive men of anything
 that will make them really and truly
 happy. Religion does not consist in
 creed and dogma, but in following
 out the simple teaching of our Lord
 and Saviour, Jesus Christ, religion
 does not consist in drawing a long
 face and heaving sighs as we pass on
 the journey of life, but in brightness
 and joy, the outcome of a Christian
 career."
 "The rules of religion are neither
 hard nor unreasonable. They can be
 condensed into two, love of God and
 love of man; and although some may
 say, 'Is that all?' It is a pretty big
 all, and involves everything contained
 in the ten commandments. Religion
 promises real enjoyment. The tenden-
 cy has been to speak so much of

heaven—and it is always easy to be
 eloquent when we talk about what we
 do not understand—as though reli-
 gion were not to bring us any enjoy-
 ment until death is swallowed up in
 victory, but religion rightly under-
 stood is indeed a present gain. Men
 make most of dying, God makes most
 of living. It the living is right, we
 need have no trouble about the dying.
 The world wants a religion today
 that not only brightens the individ-
 ual life, but will bear down upon the
 injustice, the unkindness, the indiffer-
 ence and the sins of the twentieth
 century. While the world may give a
 passing advantage and a temporary
 pleasure, there is nothing but reli-
 gion that can possibly give us that
 which would make life worth the liv-
 ing, and assure us of a triumphant
 death and a glorious eternity.
