The will of the late John Ings has been recently probated, disposing of his fine estate valued at \$300,000. The public bequests are \$1000 to St. Paul's Church, \$500 to the Sunday School in connection therewith and \$500 to the Prince Edward Island Hospital. The balance of the estate is divided between the five children of the deceased, J. Walter Ings, High River, Alberta; George A. Ings, Calgary; Fred W. Ings, Nanton; Constance Crawford Frost, Baltimore; A. E. Ings, Charlottetown. The homestead in Charlottetown is devised to A. E. Ings. The estate is mainly made up of mortgages, judgments and other loans, \$100,000; Charlottetown Steam Navigation Company, 166 shares; Bank of Nova Scotia, 108 shares; Prince Edward Island Telephone Company 208 shares.

The body of the late Wellington Gallant, of Rustico, who was accidentally killed at Toronto on July 30th, arrived at Hunter River Thursday 1st inst., by the evening train. A number of teams awaited the remains at the station and the body was thence conveyed to his home at South Rustico. The deceased had been working for upwards of a year and a half with his younger brother Joseph at the construction of a tunnel for waterworks in Toronto Bay. At the time of the accident both men were working at a tunnel work fifteen feet above the surface on shaft No. 2, where Wellington was superintendent of the work. They were standing on a piece of timber a foot square and about twenty-five feet long which was bolted at one end and in the middle while about one half of the log was projecting out. While removing the bolt at the end the timber up-ended and the two men were thrown off. Wellington who was sitting on the timber missed his hold and fell on the concrete fifteen feet below fracturing his skull on the left side of the head. His brother who was standing, was buried thirty feet in the air and fell in the water about six inches from steel piles barely escaping from death. Wellington was removed in an unconscious state to St. Michael's Hospital where he died four hours after the accident after all that medical skill could do had proved useless. The late Wellington Gallant was a man of sterling character and highly esteemed by all those who knew him. He was forty-seven years of age and leaves a sorrowing widow and a family of ten children to mourn his untimely demise. The funeral took place on Friday morning the 3rd inst at ten o'clock at St. Augustine Church where Rev. J. Chaisson sang a requiem High Mass for the repose of his soul. The pall-bearers were: Andrew Martin, Theophilus Pineau, Joseph Pitre, Martin Buote, Bruno Doucet, and Moses Martin.
