Surgical Operations For Heart Diseases

Associated Press Science Writer ALTA, Ga., March 7. (AP) — Dr. Ambrose L. Lockwood of Toronto predicted to Surgeons today that within 10 years the lives of thousands of persons suffering from one form of heart disease will be saved by the universal use of an operation which builds a new blood pipeline to the heart.

This operation, which has been tried only in a comparatively few experimental cases, is designed to relieve the stoppage of the coronary blood vessels which carry blood to the heart itself. Heretofore such stoppage always has been fatal.

With the technique developed by Dr. Calude Beck of Western Reserve University, Cleveland, O., however, the heart is given a new source of blood. A small part of the chest muscle which moves the arms is cut and one end left attached, the heart is given a new source of blood. The blood of the muscle then feeds the heart itself.

Lockwood declared before the Southeastern Surgical Congress he had performed the operation with considerable success and added: "I am firmly convinced that no procedure in all the proud galaxy of surgical triumphs has been more thoroughly and soundly developed."

Common boils and carbuncles were declared to be a relatively common cause of paralysis and even death.

When such infections, usually treated lightly by persons who acquire them, are located on the neck, or the back of the neck, near the spine, danger exists that they may spread to the spinal cord and cause a quick paralysis, Dr. George H. Columbia, Columbia, S. C., told the congress.

Such complications, which often may resemble infantile paralysis, are not uncommon, he declared, and "if left untreated, are probably always fatal."

Islander Dies In The West

The death of Fred M. Morris, of Regina, Saskatchewan, on Feb. 28th a former well-known businessman and merchant at Braddalbane, Prince Edward Island, will be learned with regret by many of his former acquaintances in these parts. Mr. Morris had been in splendid health until within a few days of his passing. He contracted influenza which developed into a case of mastoid and his death followed an operation in the Regina hospital.

Mr. Morris was born in Grandville, Prince Edward Island, and was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Cyrus Morris. Until about the year 1905, he had been in business in Braddalbane from boyhood; first as clerk with Charles Taper and Company, and later as a member of the firm of Cyrus Morris. When the firm decided to discontinue the business, Mr. Morris went to Saskatchewan, and soon became established as a member and manager of the Saskatchewan Distributing Company Ltd., located at Belle Plaine, afterwards becoming sole owner. He did a very thriving business for a number of years; and toward the end of the World War he retired to live in the city of Regina.

Besides his wife, he leaves to mourn three daughters, Marion, (Mrs. Arthur Toye) of Toronto, and the Misses Ethel and Enid at home. Mrs. Hedley Balderston and Miss Ethel Morris of Vancouver, are sisters. Rev. George Morris of St. Andrews, N. B., and Mr. C. Ray Morris of Grandville, Prince Edward Island, are brothers.

Nazi Papers' 'Jabs' Inspire Holland To Arm, Ready To Open Up Famous Dykes If Invaded

THE HAGUE, March — The Dutch, one of the sturdiest, spunkiest peoples in Europe, see a good deal of attention to Dutch affairs. They have charged that Holland has placed 16 of its frontier defense battalions on the West front, facing Germany, only seven on the South, facing Belgium and only one on the coast facing over toward England.

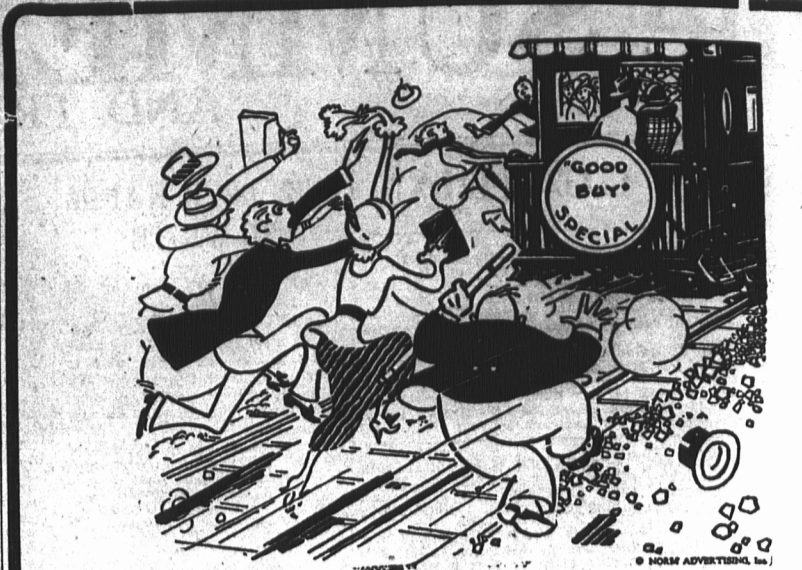
This German press campaign drew from the Dutch government the reply that Holland was determined to defend all its frontiers. There were very few soldiers in the West, because there was the sea and the navy. There were more than on the Southern because the former was far longer than the latter.

HOLLAND IS ROAD TO FLANK ATTACK

The fact is that Holland is quietly preparing against all eventualities. One of these is that in case of a conflict between France and Germany, the Germans might seek to attack the French flank, by a quick dash through Holland, thence through Belgium, thus avoiding the French Maginot line and also the Belgian fortified line. The Dutch have built no equivalent fortifications. They are relying upon a system of concrete pill boxes, machine gun nests and artillery emplacements along all the numerous canals and rivers. But so far as an advancing mechanized army is concerned, they are placing chief reliance upon their air, land and sea forces.

In case Holland were invaded from Germany, the army is prepared to open the dykes and blow the Netherlands into the provinces of Groningen, Friesland, Drenthe, Overijssel and part of North Brabant. While the foe was struggling with the swirling waters, the Dutch army would retire to "Dry Holland." This would consist mainly of the provinces of Utrecht, North and South Holland. These contain most of the great cities—Amsterdam, Rotterdam, The Hague, Utrecht, Leyden and Haarlem.

These would, of course, be liable to attack by German airplanes, but the Nazis would not have it all their own way, because the Dutch air force comprises over 500 bombers and fighters of the very latest design.
