OUR BUSINESS CONDITIONS—NO. 3.

The Legislature in its memorial to the Federal Government in April, 1906 set forth that continuous communication had been "the strongest inducement to enter confederation;" that "this stipulation had never been fulfilled;" that in the intervening years, because of such non-fulfilment the Province had sustained "incalculable losses" of trade, industry, population and representation, and it proceeded:

"We desire to press upon you that by the construction of a Tunnel under the Strait of Northumberland between the Island and the Mainland, the terms and agreement of Union between the Federal Government and this Province may be carried out and this Province may receive the same consideration with regard to inter-communication as the other Provinces of the Dominion.

This was the unanimous opinion of both parties and all the members of the Legislature, that the Tunnel was the one means best adapted to fulfill the terms of Union, to retrieve the "incalculable losses" of the past and to give the best possible security for our future. But, pressed by such support The Guardian could hardly need any further ally against the charge of "foolishness" in its advocacy of the Tunnel as a business proposition.

But we may call another witness, a man of great name and fame, into the arena and quote his words. The Right Honorable Sir Wilfrid Laurier, before he had obtained his present position and titles, wrote a letter to the then Editor of The Guardian in which he said: "Every man who has given any attention to the condition of things and the necessities involved by the Island entering Confederation must admit that such a Tunnel must be constructed if the thing is reasonably practicable."

Thus said our Legislature; thus wrote the present Prime Minister of Canada. And as a humble advocate of the Tunnel The Guardian may claim to be in very respectable and somewhat distinguished company. Who is there among the objectors whose wisdom is weighty enough to turn the scale against such high authorities?

The Tunnel would fulfil the terms of Union in regard to continuous communication by steam.

It would quiet the widespread and growing discontent; it would restore the faith of this Province in its sister Provinces.

It would retrieve the trade and business losses of the past and give assurance and hope for the future.

It would greatly increase the value of very barren lands and potatoes, of every animal on our farms, and of every pound of beef, pork or mutton we produce and of fish caught in our waters.

It would cause manufactures to spring up, giving employment to a large industrial population throughout the year.

It would at once and forever remove our ice blockade and all danger of interrupted telegraph communication.

It would carry our mails to and from the mainland every morning and evening. It would build up our city and town, increase the value of every town lot and every acre of farm land. It would recall our exiled sons and daughters to their native land, stop the exodus and so rapidly increase our population and our wealth. It is our only

hope to restore our lost representation

We have spoken of business conditions as they are, in previous articles. Where can be found so splendid and promising a business proposition for the future as the Tunnel affords?

Think of it! Representatives of our leading business houses en route to England to make their purchases, crossing at the Capes by the ice-boats after the manner of fifty years ago and unable to telegraph their arrival on the other side! Actually building a fire, after the fashion of the Indians to signify to friends on this side that they had got safely over. A ship in mid-ocean can communicate with other ships or the shore. Prince Edward Island, within a few miles of the sister Provinces, is cut off from such communication. Truly we are a patient people.

Following the Kensington meeting of a week ago other meetings are being called about the Province to discuss the non-fulfilment of the terms of Union, and the proposed increase of federal subsidies to Provinces. The Guardian learns that the first of these meetings will be held at Vernon River Bridge on Wednesday evening 13th and a meeting at Morell on Friday evening 15th. A meeting at Montserrat is also spoken of and there are other requests from the people for public discussion. Premier Peters, the Leader of the Opposition and other public men of both parties are being invited. Public interest in the great topics of the hour is a healthful symptom.

EDITOR'S MAIL.

THE CITY'S FINANCES.

Sir.—In former years it was the inviolable custom that a full itemized statement of the City Accounts should be submitted at the first regular meeting of the year. This statement was then published in the press and would inform the citizens as to the total receipts from all sources for the preceding year and the total expenditure, but this method was departed from a year ago and although we are now in the second month of 1907 no such statement has yet been given out for last year. It will be remembered that a surplus was claimed for 1905 but no accounts were submitted nor was any information given until some months after the Civic elections of 1905 were held. It was then brought to light that instead of there being a surplus the City had actually gone behind to the extent of \$4,464.19 and the cash balance to the credit of the City in the Merchant Bank of P. E. I., was reduced by that amount notwithstanding the fact that \$10,000 debentures were issued to pay for all capital expenditure. This can hardly be claimed as a satisfactory financial showing. It would almost appear that the accounts were purposely held back. Now, Mr. Editor, what information have the taxpayers, so far, as to last year's operations. We are told by Mayor Paton that the taxes were increased to the amount of \$8,300 and that there was a small surplus but, Sir, I claim that the citizens should be treated more fairly. It is their right that more particulars should be given and the full facts published. A large amount of debentures were again issued last year. Was any of the money used for ordinary expenditure and to create a surplus? How many unpaid bills were carried over into the current year? Let the citizens have the advance sheets of the City accounts at once in order that the matter may be discussed intelligently. The Patriot has stated that the financial statement is "highly creditable to all concerned." I doubt if this certification is based on any knowledge whatever. At all events the same eulogy was given a year ago whereas the very opposite was the case. "PHEBIAN."
