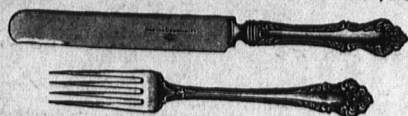

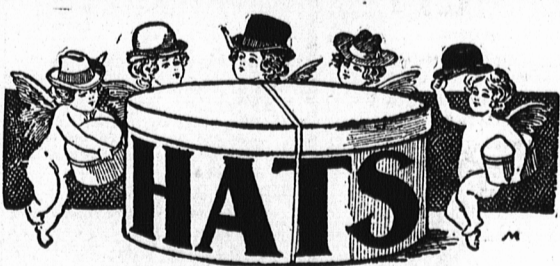

## Synopsis of Canadian North-West Homestead Regulations.

ANY even numbered section of the Indian Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 96 not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any man over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less. Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent receive authority for some one to make entry for him. The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months residence (up to three years) on the land in each year, and cultivation of the land in each year. (2) The father for mother, if the father is deceased of the homesteader resides upon a acre in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother. (3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent. W. W. C. RY, Deputy of the Minister of the Interior, 9-13th St.
