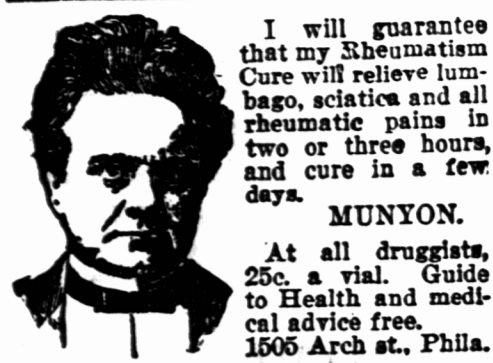

IN THE PHILIPPINES.

The anniversary of the capture of Manila was recently celebrated by the Americans in that city and was coupled with the touching ceremony of decorating the graves of 300 American soldiers who have fallen in that distant field. The incident in one respect might have served to recall the burial of Sir John Moore at Corunna, inasmuch as the ceremony took place within hearing distance of the shotguns which the foe were "sullenly firing."

It throws a strange light upon the progress of the American conquest of the Philippines to be told that a battle or bombardment could be going on at the time mentioned within five miles of Manila, but such appears to have been the fact. The American gunboats were at the time bombarding Paranaque, which is but that distance south of Manila. To the northward along the coast and for some distance inland American authority has been enforced, but so far but a very limited area around Manila appears to have been subjected.

We read that the Commission sent out with a view to ascertain the form of government best suited to the Philippines and to treat with and conciliate the native leaders, have so far failed to agree upon terms. They have begun a series of social entertainments in Manila, with a view to show American hospitality and good will, at the first of which, it is said, a number of the wealthy natives of Manila attended. This is not surprising, as United States authority is fully established in the city, and the natives find it convenient to stand in with the powers that be.

But the fact remains that the vast body of the natives of the islands are still notoriously hostile to the United States. No doubt their ignorant minds have been filled with prejudices, and they do not know what is for their good, but they are apparently as little reconciled to American as they were to Spanish rule, and are determined to fight on for independence. This is regrettable, as it means that the war may be continued indefinitely. There can be but one end, however, and that is the ultimate subjection of the Filipinos. The war may be prolonged, and may cost millions of dollars and many lives, in addition to the large expenditure of blood and treasure already made.

BETTER CARS WANTED.

Those interested in the promotion of tourist travel, as well as those in charge of our Island Railway have long felt the want of better equipment for the road. There ought to be parlor cars on the express trains for the accommodation of the considerable class of tourists who are able and willing to pay for the luxury. It is a disappointment to many visitors that when they reach our shores they are unable to obtain the sumptuous cars to which the railways of the United States and the mainland of Canada have long accustomed them. No doubt the want of parlor cars has prevented many persons and in some cases large parties of tourists, from visiting our cool and attractive Island during the summer months.

Our railway, being of narrow gauge is necessarily equipped with narrow cars, and they lack the roominess which tourists like. When filled with passengers they are decidedly uncomfortable. It is on occasions such as these that the want of parlor cars is especially felt by the wealthier class of tourists, whom it is especially desirable to attract to the Island. We trust that a strong effort may be made

to have the want supplied. The Railway has not been productive of revenue in the past, but we have reason to believe that improvement along the lines suggested would in a short time add considerably to the receipts, especially during the summer months.

When Mr. John G. Scrimgeour, of bonded warehouse fame [also a Justice of the Peace] was recently charged with a violation of the Scott Act the evidence was conflicting and the case was dismissed. The charge was for having sold between 10th February and 10th April last. Two witnesses said they got liquor but did not pay for it—they got it for nothing. There was a conflict of testimony as to whether certain sales were within the dates, though one witness swore to a purchase on the first day of March. Mr. Scrimgeour swore that he sold no liquor to that witness or any one else within the dates. Notwithstanding the failure to convict in this particular case there appears to be a strong impression that the locality of the bonded warehouse is still worth watching. Mr. Scrimgeour has given no decided evidence of a change of heart since the days when he was repeatedly convicted for Scott Act violation.

Another Giant Lobster.

CANSO, June 1.—A monster lobster was brought in here last week by one of C. H. Whitman's smacks. This giant crustacean was taken on a had-dock trawl at Petit de Grat, and although not as large as some that have been taken in other localities on this shore, is of unusual size. Its dimensions are as follows: length, from snout to end of tail, 19 inches; from end of feelers to end of tail, 19 inches; length of claws, 17 inches; from claw to claw, extended, 38 inches; weight 12 pounds.
