AFTERNOON SESSION.

At the afternoon session the sectional committees reported, viz. committee on President's address, urging upon the adoption of the valuable suggestions contained therein.

1. Resolved that the Executive be instructed to use their best endeavours to secure midsummer holidays throughout the Province.

2. Resolved that the thanks of this convention be given the Government for the recognition accorded by it to the Summer School of Science, thus securing the advantages of a session of the school for the province in 1904.

3. Resolved that the Executive endeavor to secure for the teachers who shall attend the sessions of the Summer School of Science to be held in Charlottetown in 1904 an additional week's holidays as is granted to the teachers of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

4. Resolved that the Executive be authorized to issue if found practicable, an official organ of the Association, to be furnished all members without additional charge, other than the membership fee.

5. Whereas this Association may do much to encourage, direct and assist its members in more thoroughly fitting themselves for the great and difficult work of teaching.

Therefore Resolved: that the Executive Committee be authorized and instructed to lay out courses of study for teachers in such subjects as Drawing, Music, Modern Languages, Nature Studies, Pedagogues, etc., and to arrange for the examination of those taking these and similar studies, and for the granting of certificates to those who pass such examinations.

6. Resolved that it is desirable to procure the authorization of a more suitable Canadian History for the use in the schools of this Province than the one at present prescribed.

FREE FOR ALL (FIRST HEAT).

Rosemont and Cook of the North kept even positions to the quarter. Here Rosemont made a hopeless break and for the balance of the heat Cook of the North had so competition. His was an easy but complete victory gained in 2:32, Rosemont second, Dearborn Jr. third.

FREE FOR ALL (SECOND HEAT).

Another of the best heats ever trotted in Charlottetown was again in evidence. Between John T. and Tonita F. it was a race to the finish, John T. soon clipping another quarter from the track record, reducing it to 2:17.

FREE FOR ALL (THIRD HEAT).

The Free For All, won in three straight heats best time 2:17 was John T.'s record yesterday. All three horses in the Free-For-All were favorites with the grand stand and gave splendid exhibitions of speed. Tonita won second money and Parkie third.

2:24 (FIRST HEAT).

In the 2:24 race Maisie, Sweet Singer and Princess Regent faced the wire. After a splendidly contested race, it was won by Maisie with Sweet Singer and Princess Regent in close proximity, holding respectively second and third positions.

2:24 (SECOND HEAT).

There was not a more exciting heat trotted than this. Princess Regent forced to the front at the start and although pressed hard for a time she outstripped her rivals and was soon out of danger. From start to finish she scarcely made a skip and won heaps of friends her performance. Maisie and Sweet Singer struggled hard for second place and the race between them evoked great interest. But the Georgetown mare came in victorious, Sweet Singer a third. Time 2:29.

2:24 (THIRD HEAT).

Princess Regent led at first, but gradually Maisie collared her neck and neck they trotted nearly to the half when Princess broke and thereafter it was evident that the race was Maisie's. The latter trotted a beautiful honest race in 2:25, Maisie second and Sweet Singer third.
