*WEEK OF PRAYER.—The week of prayer in Montague will long be remembered, as one of the most eventful in the history of that eastern town. The meetings were held in the different churches, and the pastors, while keeping the subjects well in mind, led up by one central thought: "The moral and social reform of Montague." The spirit of union prevailed, and large congregations greeted the speakers, every night. The climax was reached on Friday night, when Rev. Mr. Armstrong, who had taken the initiative in the liquor question throughout the week gave a forceful and stirring address on conditions in Montague, convincing all present, of the fact, that young men are being sent to destruction by rum-sellers, whose business should not be tolerated by respectable people. Words fail to express the eloquence of the address, and the hungry appeal which rang out to that great audience of Christian Montague, as at the close, he asked all who would pledge themselves to help a "central committee," clear Montague of rum-sellers and "boot-leggers," to stand up. Everyone, except three persons, were on their feet in an instant. A thrill passed through the audience, God seemed present, and women almost wept, to think at last the Christian forces of Montague were united to stamp out the "demon of strong drink." A central committee were at once appointed, and organized. Montague feels very grateful, indeed, to her clergymen, who have taken these decided steps in the right direction. The offering for the week amounted to \$32.18 and was divided equally between the P. E. Island Hospital and the Bible Society.

GERMAN AND BRITISH METHODS CONTRASTED
LONDON, Jan. 16.—Reuter's has received a complete copy of the official proclamation issued by the German Military Government to the inhabitants of the conquered territory of Italy. Placed side by side with General Allenby's proclamation to the inhabitants of Jerusalem which provided for the carrying on of business usual and safeguarding all buildings and the protection of the inhabitants of all creeds, the German document affords fresh proof of the different manner in which Great Britain and Germany wage war.

"A house to house search will be made for all concealed arms, weapons and ammunition," reads the German proclamation. "All victuals remaining in a house must be delivered up. Every citizen must obey our labor regulations; all workmen and children over fifteen years of age must work in the fields every day. Sundays included, from four o'clock in the morning until eight o'clock in the evening. Disobedience will be punished in the following manner. Lazy workmen will be accompanied in their work and watched by Germans. After the harvest they will be imprisoned for six months and every day be given nothing but bread and water. Lazy women will be obliged to work and after the harvest will receive six months imprisonment. Lazy children will be punished by beating. The commandant reserves the right to punish lazy workmen with twenty lashes daily."

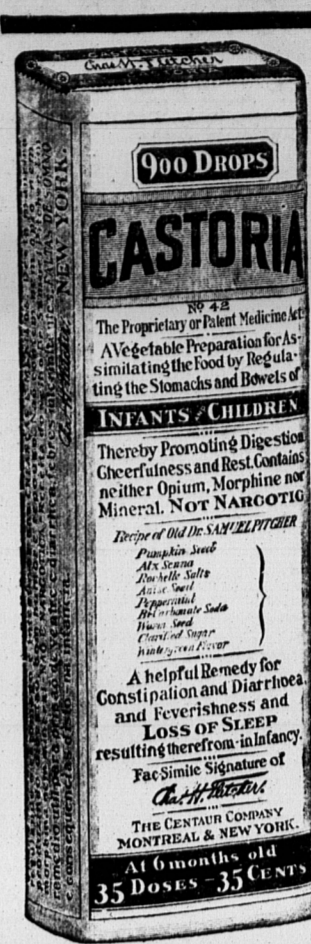

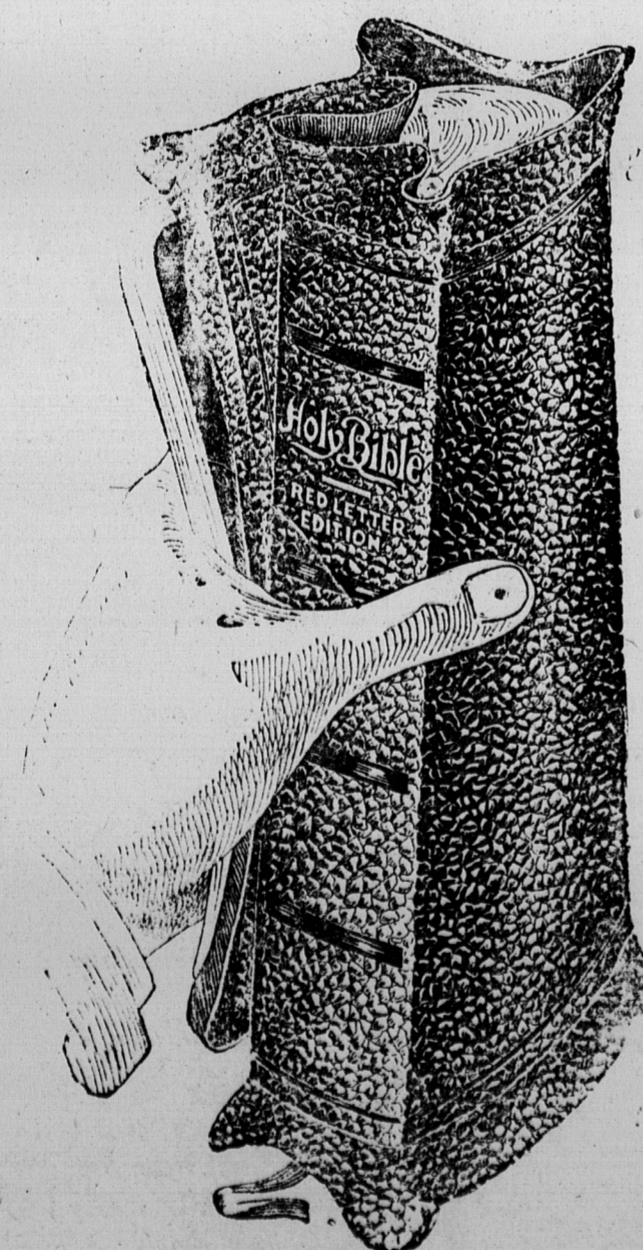
MONT BLANC SUES FOR TWO MILLION

S., Jan. 16.—An action for \$2,000,000 damages was filed in the Admiralty Court here today by the solicitors for the owners of the steamer Mont Blanc against the Norwegian-Belgian Relief steamer Imo.
