One of the officers of the cable ship Minia, writing from St. John's last week said that they had put into St. John's for supplies and bunker coal. The steamer had been looking for the original break in the European cable for six weeks, it could not be found and she was obliged to adjourn operations. It is an old line and is parted at a point 900 miles east of Newfoundland and in 2,000 fathoms of water.—Halifax Exe. (The Minia visited ports in this province recently.)

During the past week a number of the employees of Bruce Stewart & Co. have been engaged in repairing the spoon handle of the dredge Deliver, belonging to the Canada Dredging Co., now operating in Summerside harbor. The work has been completed and the tug left Saturday on return to Summerside, taking with her the scow carrying the repaired spoon handle. This handle weighs four tons and the work of repairing it was complicated and difficult, the men being obliged to work day and night in order to complete the task within the week.

A Newcastle, N. B., exchange says: The death of Catherine, widow of the late Joseph Sobey, of Protectionville, occurred on Sunday. The funeral was held this afternoon, Rev. Dr. William Harrison, officiating. Deceased was Miss Williston. By her first husband, Andrew McCormick, she leaves five children, and by her second husband she leaves two sons. MORE ICEBERGS. (Canadian Press.) NEW YORK, Aug. 14—Twenty or more icebergs were seen a few days ago off the coast of Newfoundland by the Norwegian steamer Raun which arrived today from that island with a cargo of wood pulp. The Raun was in an icefield for twenty-four hours.

PATRICIA WINS OUT. CHICAGO, August 14—The Canadian sloop Patricia to-day won the international championship of the Great Lakes from the American yacht Michigan. To-day victory made three in a row for the Canadian. The American boat won the first race of the series. Patricia won to-day by eight minutes and 35 seconds. Her elapsed time was 4.14.52. The contest was to windward and leeward four miles and a-half to the leg, sailed twice. Gameness and smart work won for the Canadian crew.

UNOTHER SHIP GOES ASHORE. HALIFAX, Aug 15—The British steamship Eric, of Cardiff, is ashore on Sable Island. The captain's message stated that the steamer struck at 11.30 this morning. The steamer struck on the south side, opposite the wireless station, about the center of the island, where she is lying easy. The captain asked that a wrecking boat be sent down with appliances for pulling her off. He said he had filled the tanks to prevent the steamer being carried further in, and he believed that if the weather continues favorable there would be a chance to get her off. There were no wrecking boats available yesterday, but it is believed that the Bridgewater may be secured to-day, and if so, she will be sent down at once. The Eric was bound from Rosario with a cargo of maize for Quebec, via Sydney.
