Starter was Ken MacDougall, Moncton, and the crowd was estimated at 2,000.

### Upsets Dot Card In Fine Night Racing Program Saturday

Marked by close, exciting finishes in practically every heat the night racing program held at the Exhibition track Saturday, Sept. 5, once again provided a large-sized crowd of spectators with racing thrills galore as the trotters and pacers battled it out from wire to wire.

There were plenty of upsets in the rugged duels of speed witnessed with the most outstanding one being the Guy Aubrey victory in the seventh dash of the program, a win that paid off his pari-mutuel backers with \$21.00 for every two dollars bet. Then there was Follow Us in the fourth event on the card and Jessica Direct 2nd in the fifth and sixth dashes on the card, the only horse able to chalk up a double victory during the evening.

Bonnie Dale came through in the stretch to capture the mile and half event from a field of four trotters, while Babe Britton, driven by Lt. Col. D. A. MacKinnon, continuing her fine pacing performance, took a new win tab of 2:10 3-5 in heading a strong field in the number three event on the card.

Mayme Axworthy came through as expected in pacing to a win in the first event on the card as she headed Random Harvest, but one second time the same field met in the sixth dash it was a different story as Random Harvest, getting to the front early was never headed.

Sugar Harvest was the winner of the number two event but was forced to yield to the rush of Guy Aubrey in the seventh dash. Then to keep matters going Babe Britton, after taking her new record of 2:10 3-5 in the third dash on the card, jumped it off in number eight event to drop far back; she came on again after setting flat but couldn't catch up to the fleet going field led by the steady-going Nell Kalmuck.

Follow Us, Moncton-owned horse had just too much trot for the field in winning the number four event, a victory that added to the upsets that dotted the card; he was drawn as the field came out for a mile and a half test in the ninth event and it was Bonnie

Dale coming terrifically fast from the top of the stretch that led the field as the five trotters hit the wire.

It was 1-1 for Jessica Direct 2nd in dashes number five and ten. In the first mile it was Bonnie's Boy who furnished the competition while in the second mile Colleen Adam came up at the latter end of the mile to challenge the superiority of the free pacing leader.
