C.B.C. TEAM VICTORIOUS

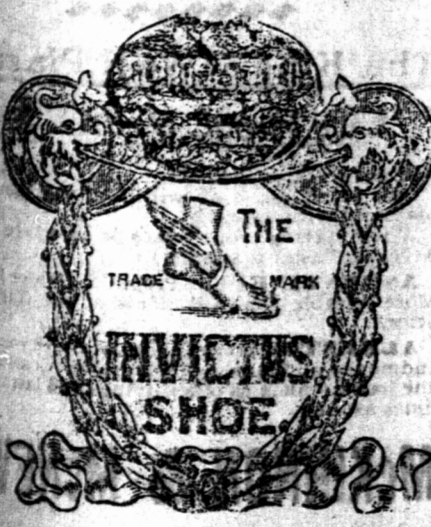
Defeating the Stars of Souris by a Score of 6-2.

There was a large audience at Hillsboro Rink last night to witness the final games of hockey of the season. The matches were played between teams representing Souris vs C. B. C. and S. D. C. vs P. W. C. The first game between S. D. C. and P. W. C. commenced at five minutes after eight and after a few minutes of swift play Sharpe shot a goal for the Princes on cover point. After twenty minutes play Kehoe evened up the score for the Saints, followed by Holman for the Princes. Eric McLean scored a few minutes before half-time, and when the bell rang the score stood 3-1 in favor of the Princes. In the second half Holman commenced play for the Princes, followed by McLean, but being put in by an off-side play it was disallowed by the referee. Before the bell rang the Princes added another to their score, making the final count 4-1 in favor of the Princes. The second game between the Stars of Souris and the C. B. C. team began at 9.45 and although somewhat slow was the most exciting game of the evening. The principal part of the play was in the Star's territory and at half time the score was 1-0 in the C. B. C.'s favor. The Stars made a good defence however, but need more practice. In the second half the play was much faster than the first half. McQuillan scored the first goal in this half for the C.

NUMIDIAN ARRIVES—ROUGH TRIP. HALIFAX, March 8.—(Special).—The S.S. Numidian, with the Strathcona Horse reached port early this morning. The men are all well except Private A. Robinson, who is ill with pneumonia. The men had a very rough trip. COL. STEEL DENIES STORIES. Col. Steele denies the stories of cruel treatment of Boers by the Strathconas and declares there was not a better body of men living; that they were humane and did honor to Canada. The Strathconas left immediately for Ottawa. GEN. FRENCH CAPTURES SEVEN GUNS. LONDON, March 8.—(Special).—The Boers failed in their attack upon Lichtenburg and the Boer general Cellioes was killed. Gen. French reports the capture of seven guns. KITCHENER ARRANGES AN ARMISTICE. Lord Kitchener and Botha have made a seven days armistice to enable Botha to confer with the other Boer generals. ANNUAL EXHIBITION VOICE OF PEOPLE

A Meeting of Farmers from Different Parts of the Province

HELD IN THE CITY YESTERDAY AFTERNOON

Prominent Farmers Contend that the Abolition of Annual Exhibitions Would be an Irreparable Loss—The Government Urged to Make a Grant—The Official Report of the Meeting as Furnished The Guardian by Mr. C. R. Smallwood.

Mr. Blake followed in the same line. Hon. R. Munn spoke in favor of exhibition and stated that in his belief every year when no exhibition was held it put the live stock, butter and cheese industries back at least five years. John A. Ferguson expressed himself in favour of exhibitions. James Essory, Union Road, stated that at the last exhibition he was not prepared with his stock but now he is prepared and registered his stock and will lose heavily if exhibitions are not held every year. J. W. Callbeck, Augustine Cove thought it marvellous if any agricultural province such as ours is, is not able to hold an exhibition and thought that not holding an exhibition was a step which no government would take. Jabez Lea, Esq., Victoria, said that it is a necessity to make up a grant for an exhibition he will give whatever prize he may win for the benefit of the others. He also stated he would save the Government from all harm by the people of Tryon if the Government will give a grant for one exhibition yearly for the whole Island. Matthew Smith, Esq., M. P. P. of Hampton spoke strongly in favor of exhibitions and stated that the general feeling throughout the country was against the Government when no exhibition was held and the contrary proved to be the case when they gave exhibitions. It was not to be expected that Nova Scotia and New Brunswick would allow our people to exhibit there if we did not have an exhibition where exhibitors from those provinces could compete. He was strongly in favor of one exhibition annually for the whole province. Every year farmers lay out for it and every year missed drives us back. He would use his utmost endeavors for exhibitions annually. Mr. C. C. Gardiner stated that preparation for exhibitions is everything and any year without an exhibition causes preparations to cease. If we neglect our exhibitions it will be a very retrograde movement indeed, especially now that we have established a Department of Agriculture. Mr. John Robertson, Inkerman, stated he had attended a great many exhibitions and could say that all he knew he learned there. Sometimes he was beaten and sometimes not. When he was successful he was glad and when beaten it made him determined to win the next year and he did win. In all lines, agricultural, horticultural and others, great deterioration had taken place on account of no exhibitions having been held for a year or two and if another gap were to take place now it would be ruinous. He closed by stating he was heartily in favor of exhibitions and had come twenty-six miles purposely to attend the meeting. Mr. J. S. Clark, Bay View, spoke in favor of annual exhibitions and the Island must have them. He advocated having a lecture room added as soon as possible where the Judges could give reasons for their judgment. He stated that in his opinion anything else than one exhibition each year in Charlottetown would be a mistake. Mr. E. Bayfield stated that the difference between the old exhibition of fruit and that at the present day is marvellous. He wished this matter had been brought before the Fruit Growers Annual meeting he was sure there would have been a unanimous vote in favor of exhibitions. Mr. James Howard, Cornwall, stated that in his opinion we should have exhibitions every year and it is a great mistake if we do not. An exhibition is an educator. He had been an exhibitor for 20 years or more of butter cheese etc., and whatever success he had, was largely if not altogether owing to what he had learned at the exhibitions. Mr. Albert Boswell, Pownal, stated that he was in favor of exhibitions every year. He had attended Halifax and St. John every year and it had done him a lot of good. He had done fairly well there as well as here and if we did not have an exhibition here this year he would likely be shut out from the other provinces. Mr. Isaac Essory said he was strongly in favor of exhibitions. Mr. W. H. Rodd, North Wiltshire stated that in old times you may say there were no Exhibitions in comparison with those that have been held under the present management, but now every one was interested. He had been successful at exhibitions and if he did not attend them every year he could never compete successfully. If it had not been for exhibitions our people would never have gone into the butter and cheese industries. If there is not an exhibition each year these industries will soon go down. Exhibitions have started and maintained them. They say we are going to have to pay more taxes than we are paying and he would pay as much more taxes as he is now if the government give us an Exhibition every year. Mr. J. C. Irving of Cherry Valley said he heartily endorsed the opinions expressed in favor of an exhibition and that his father D. P. Irving is also in favor of exhibitions every year. Mr. Jabez Lea moved the following resolution which was seconded by Hon. Bodarick Munn and supported by Messrs J. A. Ferguson and John Robertson. "Resolved that in the opinion of the

farmers of this province now assembled a Maritime Exhibition should be held there in yearly. Isolated as we are it is largely by means of such exhibitions that we are enabled to keep in touch with the constantly improving methods of feeding and dairying and in agriculture and horticulture generally. "We respectfully urge upon the Government the need of such exhibitions and request that a sum sufficient may yearly be granted to enable them being held, satisfied that such expenditure is in the best interests of the Province, opening up markets for our farm products, and assisting us in holding our position as an agricultural community in the keen competition now everywhere around us. "Also resolved that the Fruit Grower's Association and all the agricultural or Farmers' Associations throughout the Province be requested to act with this meeting, and petition the Government to hold an annual agricultural exhibition." These resolutions on being put to the meeting were carried unanimously.
