THE GRAND TRUNK'S DENIAL.

When the story was published here that the Grand Trunk Pacific intended to abandon the section of their contract between Edmonton and the Pacific the Guardian pronounced it an almost incredible report. We are glad now to be able to print an official denial. F. W. Morse, Vice President and General Manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific is thus reported:

"In reply to the article emanating from the Vancouver World to the effect that the building of the Grand Trunk Pacific from Edmonton west will be delayed for some years, I will say that our work west of Edmonton is being prosecuted with as much vigor as is possible at this time of the year. The Grand Trunk Pacific will have its railway completed from the east, extending through to the Pacific coast, well within the time called for in the contract entered into with the Dominion Government, which requires that it be ready for operation in 1911."

There is however, no new light upon the important question whether the section between Quebec and Moncton will be proceeded with at present or at all. We do not regard this as a matter of prime importance. It is certainly of less consequence than the western section referred to, as the Intercolonial between Quebec and Moncton will bear a much heavier traffic than it now carries.

This spring there will be nearly 1,000 miles of the Transcontinental under construction. As to the selection of the name Prince Rupert for the Pacific terminal, it may be said that it has met with but little approbation, while a number of newspapers have strongly condemned it. Prince Rupert was never in America, was not much better than a pirate in fact, and the name does not come within the terms set out for the name competition. The Montreal Witness and other journals of prominence have severely criticised the choice and a British Columbia paper has pronounced it impossible of acceptance.

The first division in the Imperial House of Commons occurred on Col. Saunderson's proposed amendment to the Address, which was voted down 406 to 83. The Irish Nationalists must evidently have voted with the Government. Mr. Bryce, Chief Secretary for Ireland declined to state the nature of the measures which the Government would take for improving the administration of Irish affairs, but it is significant that he announced himself as in full accord with the principles of the Liberal party when under Gladstone's leadership from 1888 to 1893. This would seem to be an endorsement of Home Rule.

THE LAURIER BANQUET.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has long been popular among the Liberals of Ontario, only less so in fact than in his native Province of Quebec. But the elements of popular favor are in large part different in the two Provinces. In Quebec his race and religious faith are strong factors. It pleases French Canadian feeling to have a compatriot at the head of national affairs and in the seat of power and they see that Sir Wilfrid is the only French Canadian to whom that high position would be possible. In Ontario on the contrary neither his race nor his religion goes to make him popular. But his silken strength, his pleasing address, his great power of persuasive speech, his sunny ways, and his broadminded charity in religious matters commend him strongly to the favor of his party.

Every party must have a leader and at present Ontario has no man who could reasonably aspire to the position. Therefore Sir Wilfrid has no rival in Ontario and the rank and file of the party readily accord him first place. He has succeeded as a leader in winning and retaining approval. Moreover, so far as the honesty of intention is concerned Sir Wilfrid is admittedly one of the best men in his party. This counts for much, for Ontario Liberalism is somewhat in decadence, both in man and principles if judged by the standard of former days. At any rate the Toronto banquet appears to have been a great tribute to Sir Wilfrid as a party leader, and evidences that he is in no danger of being supplanted by any rival in that quarter.

More and more clergymen are coming into politics. The latest is Rev. Joseph Gaetz of Annapolis who is nominated by the county Temperance Alliance to run as a prohibition candidate in opposition to the Liberal candidate. Sometimes a clergyman makes a good politician but if successful in that line he usually ceases to be of much use as a preacher.

The announcement is made that there are 20,000 abandoned farms in the State of New York. That means that so many farms cannot be profitably cultivated and pay the taxes imposed thereon. Twenty thousand farms is more than the total number of farms on Prince Edward Island. There are also many thousands of abandoned farms in New England. These are not evidences of prosperity but the reverse, and should be considered by any who may contemplate a removal to Uncle Sam's domains.

ROJESTVENSKY RESURRECTED

St. PETERSBURG, Feb. 21.—"Perhaps I am guilty to some extent for our defeat and perhaps my subordinates did not do all they might have done, but at all events we who fought the battle were not thieves," said Admiral Rojestvensky, who addressed the Imperial technical society yesterday evening upon the causes of the defeat of the Russians at the battle of the Sea of Japan.

The admiral made no specifications regarding raciality in the construction of equipment upon the destructive effect of the heavy Japanese shells, which when they only exploded in the water near the Russian vessels, cracked their plates and opened great leaks, while those which hit the Russian ships squarely were as destructive as mines.

A young lieutenant, during the discussion, attempted to lay the blame on submarine boats, but the admiral denied the submarine boat or mine theory.
