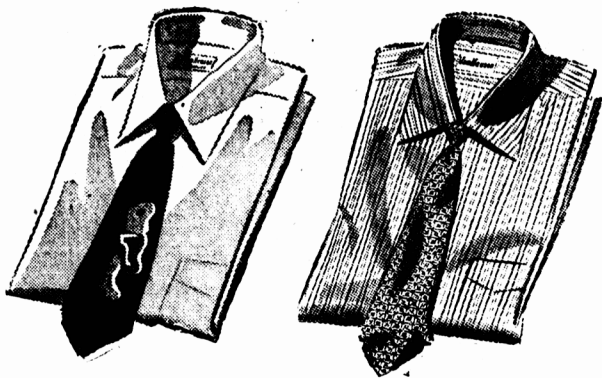

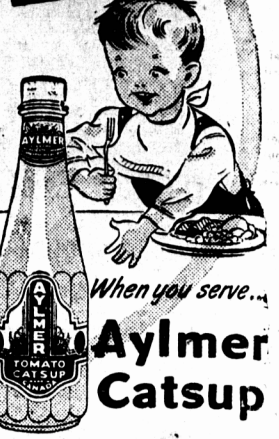

DAMAGES CASE OPENS — The case opened yesterday in the Supreme Court in Summerside, before Mr. Justice Mark R. MacGuigan and a jury of Frank MacDougall and Josephine MacDougall vs. Curran and Briggs Ltd., an action for \$5,000.00 damages. The evidence concluded yesterday and the address to the jury by counsel and the judge's charge will be given today. The case is an action on damages claimed arising from the alleged negligence of the defendant in the operation of a motor vehicle on the public highway at or near Richmond whereby the son of the plaintiff, Donald MacDougall was killed. The accident occurred in the fall of 1946 when a truck left the highway and overturned. The deceased was a passenger in the cab of the truck. Mr. W. E. Bentley, K. C. and Mr. Heath Strong, K. C. are representing the plaintiffs and Mr. T. Leland Linkletter is counsel for the defendant. —S.

456 Forest Fires In Ontario This Year

A total of 456 forest fires in Ontario this year have destroyed 17,000 acres of bushland, Forest Minister Scott announced today. Careless smokers are blamed for 29 per cent of the fires, settlers for 23 per cent and railways 18 per cent. OTTAWA, June 13 — (CP) — Average weekly wages of workers rated by the hour in leading Canadian manufactures was \$42.08 at April 1 compared with \$41.97 a month before and \$37.02 at April 1 last year, the Bureau of Statistics reported today. Average hourly earnings rose to 98.1 cents, a gain of a half-cent over March and 9.1 cents higher than April last year. Routine Business At S'Side Town Council Meeting

Matters of a routine nature were discussed at the regular meeting of the Summerside Town Council held last evening with Mayor J. F. Arnett presiding and all members of the Council present. A number of petitions for sidewalks were read and a resolution was passed that they would be done when the work now in progress is completed. Councillor T. D. Morrison said that he thought that these petitions should be taken in the order required. He said there is urgent need for a sidewalk at the top of Summer Street where they have neither a road or a sidewalk and petition has been in for months. The new hospital is going ahead on the street and the people on the street want the sidewalk to be on the hospital side, they will have to wait until the area can be laid off. He said he had talked to some of the residents and they understood the situation. Councillor Morrison said, "all I know is that when I meet any of the residents I am asked when they are going to get a sidewalk or a street. It should be done before fall." Mayor Arnett said it would be done as soon as possible. Councillor J. L. Gorrill said that Milton Avenue should be done now. Councillor Henry Wedge, chairman of the street committee said it is intended to do the work in the order in which the petitions have come. Summer Street will be done as soon as possible but if it were done now it might be necessary to tear some of it up later. Councillor Wedge reported also that work is going forward on the patching of paved streets. A resolution was passed, on motion of Councillor Gerald Sheen seconded by Councillor Lorne Driscoll, that Mr. J. S. DesRoches be appointed a member of the School Board, succeeding Mr. Mark Gaudet who has asked to be retired. Mrs. Robert Dewar was appointed hostess of the information bureau at Read's Corner at a salary of one hundred dollars per month for three months, on motion of Councillor Gorrill seconded by Councillor Sheen. On motion, the Ladies Aid of the Prince County Hospital was given authority to hold tag days on July 7, 8, and 9. A new scale of wages for the employees of the Electric Light Department, which means an increase in pay for most of them, was approved. Councillor Wedge gave a report on the annual meeting of the Federation of Mayors and Municipalities held recently in Quebec which was attended by him and Councillor Driscoll. —S.

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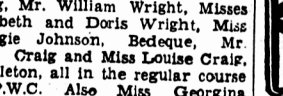

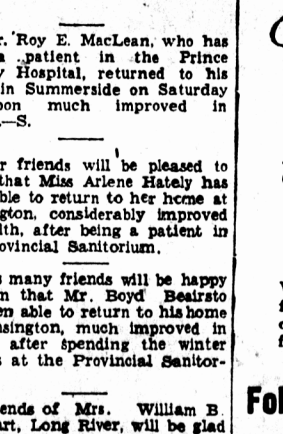
