FISH PLENTIFUL BUT BAIT SCARCE

LOUISBURG, July 8.—The fishermen along the coast have been very much hampered the past few weeks by the great scarcity of bait, and also by the dogfish nuisance. Both lobsters and codfish appear to be fairly plentiful on the grounds when bait can be procured, but the supply is very uncertain.

Capt. Devine of the American schooner Elsie in port today reports that during the past five weeks he has visited Labrador, St. Pierre, Newfoundland and the Cape Breton coast in search of bait, but is unable to get a sufficient supply to properly prosecute the voyage.

In the event of the Gorton Pew Fisheries Company establishing here which appears to be an assured fact, this bait handicap will be removed, as they have promised in their agreement with the town to always keep a supply of bait on hand for the shore fishermen's use.

RAILWAY STATION AT BEAR RIVER ROBBED

DIGBY, July 9.—Yesterday at noon while Lovell Winchester, the Station Agent at the Bear River P. E. I. Station, had gone to dinner, the Station was entered and the contents of the till amounting in cash and checks to about \$140.00 was taken. Chief Police Bowles of Digby was summoned as soon as the discovery was made and at once started for the scene of the robbery.

It is believed that a regular organized band of thieves are at work in this part of the country. The prisoner, arrested on Friday for breaking and entering several stores in Digby, and who gave his name as Arthur Waiton, stated that he was only one of a gang who were engaged in robberies, and it is now believed that the statement was correct.

Chief Police Bowles was out all night with a party of searchers, but returned without finding any trace of the burglars. Waiton claimed that he belonged to the United States, but it is not known where the other supposed burglars have come from.

There is much excitement prevailing in this vicinity, and everybody is anxious to do all they can to aid in catching guilty parties, who are at present a menace to this part of the Province.

It is reported this afternoon that burglars had been seen in the long down woods back of Bear River Station. Chief Police was notified immediately by Agent Winchester, and at once started with a gang of men to try and capture them.

TRAPPED THROUGH PARTS OF CANADA

LONDON, July 7.—To a cripple whose experiences of life have included being tramped in parts of Canada, and the United States, Premier Asquith yesterday awarded a civil list pension of £50 (\$250) in consideration of his literary merits, and inadequate means of support. MORE SHIPS BUT SMALLER TONNAGE

WASHINGTON, July 7.—More vessels were built in the United States during last year than the previous fiscal year, but they were of considerable less aggregate tonnage.

The number was 1,727, and the tonnage 302,391, as against 1,502 in 1910, of 347,025 gross tons.

There is a falling off of 65,000 ton in building on the Great Lakes. The largest vessel built on the Lakes was the bulk freighter, William Palmer of 7,602 gross tons. On the seaboard the Honolulu of 7,053 gross tons, was the largest built under the coastwise laws and for the Tehuantepec Railroad trade. No vessels were built exclusively for foreign trade, and no square rigged vessels.

The year's construction comprised 1,123 steam and motor vessels, of 246,540 tons; eighty-five sail vessels, of 11,393 tons, and 319 unrigged barges and canal boats of 44,453 tons.

CHTOWN HORSE IS LONG LIVED

That noble animal the horse has ever been reputed for its faithfulness, intelligence and endurance and perhaps in no other portion of the globe are these excellent qualities more pronounced in its breeding of this part of the world than here. And again it is claimed that in later years the P. E. I. horse has wonderfully improved in these points, much to the pleasure of their owners. Here the animal's intelligence might be credited, perhaps unduly, with properly divining the position of their owners when forbidden by law to use mechanical inventions to "get there and back" on the streets and highways and are exerting themselves the more in appreciation of the tribute to their value which might be implied by the passing of the act. But this is wandering from the subject.

Job Ward, city, owns a horse which is a remarkable one, especially so in connection with its age and present value. This horse is said to be 25 years of age and yet is of the appearance of very many years less than that. He is used every day in Mr. Ward's business and also in pleasure driving and is as spry as a colt when in harness. As befits remarkable age he is kind and gentle, yet never appearing lazy or wearied. His teeth are good, he eats well, his feet are firm and his sleek coat, long tail and bushy mane belie the years accredited him. He was brought to this city many years ago by Col. D. Stewart who used him in his bakery delivery. For over ten years he was later in Large's Livery Stable and rendered excellent service. J. J. Davies then had him at the Cliff Hotel and finally, about four years ago, Mr. Ward became his possessor. The animal was sired by an Abdallah and reared by Samuel Martin, Hope River, now out West, who sold him to Col. Stewart. The horse is still young in appearance and must have a rugged constitution to withstand the years of strenuous service he has passed through. He is an exceptionally good sample of a P. E. I. Island horse and, given the good care at present bestowed on him by Mr. Ward, he will likely add some more numerals to his already old age figure.
