**PUSH FORWARD**

WITH THE NORTHERN ITALIAN ARMY IN ETHIOPIA, At the Front, Feb. 20.—(Delayed—A. P.)—Italy's northern army resumed the offensive today and conquered important new territory without so much as a shot being fired.

A force of 20,000 white troops marched 12 miles covering 20 new towns to add new laurels following major conquests last week. Thirty-five towns were captured in a battle between Feb. 10 and 15.

No sign was seen of the army of 50,000 of Ras Muligheba, Ethiopian minister of war, continuing a swift retreat to the south.

Total territory conquered by Italy since Feb. 10 is 1920 square kilometers, one-fourth of which was taken today.

There were indications the army would now rest for a few days before the final attack. There were indications that so far this front is concerned the war is all but over.

The advance today took in all of the fertile plain of Bule and set up a new line to the foothills of the mountain range.

**Loan Sought**

LONDON, Feb. 21.—(C. P. Havas)—Agents of Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia are negotiating with private British financial interests for a \$3,000,000 loan, financial circles reported here tonight.

It also has been suggested in some quarters that the government should grant a state loan to Ethiopia if the projected League of Nations oil embargo against Italy is not put into effect. This question, it is understood, will be discussed by the Cabinet next week.

According to reports, \$15,000,000 of the proposed private loan would be paid in cash in Addis Ababa, with the remaining \$15,000,000 in London to pay for war materials already purchased.

With the winter months now more than half over, it won't be too long before thoughts turn to the waterfront and its coming activities. First of all the writer takes a glance at what was laid up at the port for the winter months and found the C. G. S. Cartier, C. G. S. Bayfield, C. G. S. Brant and Dredge Pownal No. 2 at the Marine Wharf. Hauled up on the Marine shore are the Dredge No. 1, Fishery Patrol Boat Ostervik, II, and the Department of Public Works Launch. Tied up at her own wharf is the S. S. Hillsboro. At Bruce Stewart & Co.'s wharf there is the Tug Amla and the government tug Canoe along S. S. Fairview and the Tug Bally.

At A. Pickard & Co.'s wharf is the S. S. Harland and one lone sailing vessel, namely "Eliza Coreham." At this point your correspondent will state a few remarks on the old and new Rocky Point ferry boats.

As is already known a new ferry was built in Georgetown and brought here and is now lying at Bruce Stewart & Co.'s wharf where finishing touches are being put on her. It is expected that only time is needed to take up her new duties as a sailing vessel, namely "Eliza Coreham." At this point your correspondent will state a few remarks on the old and new Rocky Point ferry boats.

It is quite some time since she has been in service having been tied up at the Marine Wharf since she ended her surveying cruises.

In closing your correspondent would like to mention a few facts about a certain steamer which is owned and operated here, the steamer is Tug Amla, formerly the C. G. S. Brant, now owned by Messrs. Bruce Stewart & Co. She was built on all Island timber by the late Captain John White, and her boiler and engine by her present owners some thirty-six years ago. It is understood she has still her original tubes that were placed in her boiler, not one of which has had to be plugged, which is certainly quite a record and worthy of mention for the firm of Bruce Stewart & Co., her present owners. For the past few years she has been attending to a Government tug and is expected will be again in service this coming season. A new and more complete list of ships and their activities will be given by this paper at a later date.

## "Does Crime Pay," Lecture at Kensington

The futility of crime as a career and contravening the laws of God and man was amply and graphically illustrated at King George Hall, Kensington in the two hour address of Bill Biddle on Wednesday night. Mr. Biddle held his audience spellbound. He depicted in gripping language the utter foolishness and degradation of foolishness and degradation of foolishness giving away to criminal fits of anger and hatred, and cited many particular cases—illustrated by stereotyped views. He deprecated the fact that crime has increased over 100 per cent in the last ten years—the increase being with youths under twenty years of age. He blames the business and the lack of proper parental training and environment. And fathers and mothers not making pals of their children. He laid bare to his audience the story of his early home life in Ontario, his emigration to Pennsylvania—his mother's death—his father's second marriage—resistance to parental authority, tyranny of his step-mother, his running away to Philadelphia at the age of twelve years, his capture and sentence to industrial reform school, where he associated with the other boys who were in the same way as he. He related how he started him after his release on a career of crime which terrorized Pennsylvania for years. After doing eighteen years in Sing Sing and writing many books against crime, he started a continent-wide campaign to make easier the lot of prisoners and to try to make them go straight on release.
