American League Wins Battle Of Stars

Williams' 3-Run Homer Cops 7-5 Verdict At Detroit

BRIGGS STADIUM, DETROIT, July 8—(AP)—In the most thunderous climax in the history of baseball's big all-star spectacle, Ted Williams smashed a three-run homer 90 feet high against the top of the right field stands in the ninth inning today to lift the American League to a 7-5 triumph over the National League.

The crowd of 56,674, third largest in the nine-year life of the fans' "dream game," had been dazzled earlier by brilliant pitching and by two booming home runs by Arky Vaughan which brought the National League up to the final inning with an apparently impregnable 5-3 advantage.

Then two singles and a walk loaded the bases with one out and there was a shrill, spontaneous outburst from the fans as Joe Dimaggio stalked to the plate. He forced a runner at second, one run scoring, and there was an obvious dramatic tenseness as Williams, Boston Red Sox slugger with a batting average of .405, took his place in the box and worked the count to two balls and one strike.

Umpire Lou Jorda, a National League, working behind the plate the last half of the game, called in the ball and inspected it. Then he tossed out a new one to pitcher Claude Passeau, the seasoned ace of Chicago Cubs, and a moment later Williams slammed it on a vicious line against the top of the press box in right field 325 feet away and close to the four marker.

This was the American League's sixth victory against three defeats and continued their record of never having been defeated when they were the home team.

B.B. Feller and Whitlow Wyatt opened today's prize bundle with some of the finest airtight pitching the game has ever produced.

Feller, fireballer of Cleveland Indians, worked the first three innings for the American League and never looked any more wonderful, fanning four batters while allowing one hit and facing only the minimum of nine in his turn on the mound.

Wyatt, a former American League pitcher who at the age of 32 is cutting capers for Brooklyn Dodgers, was kept on duty only two innings by Manager Bill McKechnie and allowed no hits.

The National League plot used the same tactics which were successful last year at St. Louis and made frequent change in his line-up, altogether getting 22 of his 25 players into action.

He sprung a surprise by installing Paul Derringer of his own Cincinnati Reds in the mound in the third inning and the big right-hander mowed down the foe in order in that frame, but was made the victim of the American League's first scoring threat in the fourth when Cecil Travis of Washington and Williams, this year's glamor boy of the diamond, hit a pair of doubles.

Bucky Walters, another Red Sox star, took over in the fifth and pitched shutout ball. He also tied up the score in the first half of the sixth by opening with a double, advancing to third on a sacrifice and scoring after a long fly by Terry Moore of St. Louis Cardinals.

This tally came off Lefty Thornton Lee of Chicago White Sox who had taken over where Feller left off.

Walters was punctured for a run in the last of the sixth when he walked two men and Lou Bourqueau of Cleveland singled, but Vaughan's homers, one each off young Sid Hudson of Washington Senators and Lefty Ed Smith of White Sox, seemed to take the pressure off the Nationals.

His first followed a single by Enco Slaughter of the Cards and the second came after Johnny Mize of the same team had doubled.

With this backing Passeau appeared capable of struggling through his assignment on the mound. He set the Americans down in order in the seventh, striking out pinch hitter Charley Keller and he worked himself out of a dangerous predicament in the eighth.

He might have worked out of the ninth if pinch-hitter Ken Keltner and Gordon singled and Travis waited out a base on balls to load the bases. The elder Dimaggio then rapped a tantalizing grounder to shortstop Eddie Miller of Boston, who threw to Herman at second for one out but Travis, sliding into the base, made Herman's throw to first difficult and he pulled Cincinnati's Frank McCormick off the

Skinner showed he knew every trick of his own course, where he is pro, by shooting another par 71 to win the professional and open honors with a perfect 36-hole total of 142.

Reed finished runner-up in the open, 14 strokes behind Skinner. Third place went to Larry Thornton, Moncton pro, who had 157. Pete Kelly, Amherst, amateur champion of the previous three tournaments, fell down to a third place tie with David Caughy, St. Andrews, in the amateur standing. They tied for seventh place in the open.

Dr. W. E. Gray, Milltown, N.B., led senior entrants by finishing fifth in the amateur with 168. Aroostook Valley had the best team score, 670.

Snead captures Medal round

DENVER, July 8—(AP)—Samuel Jackson Snead, the man who had only one day to prepare, considered a doubtful starter in this tournament, roared home today to win qualifying honors of the National Professional Golfers Association championship.

The ex-Virginia hillbilly who won the Canadian Open title in 1940, strutted in with a par-breaking 69, identical with his first-round score on the lake and creek criss-crossed Cherry Hills course, for a 36-hole total of 138. Par for the course is 35-36-71.

He won a diamond-studded medal for the feat. For a cripple who only recently had discarded a back brace, Snead turned in a husky performance.

Snead nosed out E. J. (Dutch) Harris of Chicago by one stroke. Harris lacked up a 71 alongside a first-round 68 which enabled him to share pace-setting laurels at the halfway mark.

The other 18-hole co-leader, Harry Bassier, dark horse from Los Altos, Calif., topped on his first nine today for a two-over-par 37. He finished in 36 blows for a 73 and a two-day total of 141.

Benny Hogan, standout favorite to win the tournament, finished in a tie at 140 with two fellow Texans, Jimmy Demaret and Henry Ransom, and George Fazio, who registers from Philadelphia.

Three places were open for the match play round beginning tomorrow. Byron Nelson of Toledo, Ohio, qualified automatically as defending champion.
