BRITISH LINES ADVANCE IN PALESTINE (Special to The Guardian) LONDON, April 12.—British troops on April 9 advanced their line north of Jerusalem in Palestine to a depth of one and a half miles along a front of five miles, the British War Office announced today, notwithstanding the stubborn resistance of the Turks, the British captured the villages of Rafat and El Keir.

U. S. Submarines Have Crossed Atlantic WASHINGTON, April 12.—In the face of bitter winter gales, American submarines, primarily designed for

operations off the home coasts have crossed the Atlantic to engage in the common fight against German U-boats. They are now aiding Allied naval forces as are American destroyers and American naval aviators, and they have been in the war zone for some months. Secretary Daniel revealed the fact that the submarines had gone "over there" in his address at Cleveland last Saturday at a Liberty Loan celebration, but gave no details. It is now possible, however, to tell for the first time of the mid-winter passage of the boats across the seas in the face of the most severe weather known in years. In the perilous passages, the best traditions of the service have been maintained.

Little has been said of the work of the British and French submarines in the U-boat hunt. They are playing a definite part, however, and lurking close to the enemy bases. There have been encounters between submarines, reports of which read like fiction. The service has been described as a try-

ing one for which men of courage and daring are needed. It is in this work, presumably, that the American submarines are engaged.

VON HINDENBURG SLIGHTLY WOUNDED

(Special to The Guardian) LONDON, April 12.—A despatch to the Daily Press from Geneva says that a despatch received at Scuirchik, from St. Rasburg, states that Von Hindenburg is in a private hospital there, suffering from "a slight wound caused by one of the Allies' airplanes on the western front."

(Special to The Guardian) PETROGRAD, April 12.—Under the terms of the Peace Treaty the Commissioner of Commerce announces Russia has lost 780,000 square kilometres of territory, with 56 million inhabitants or 32 percent of the entire population of the country.

Dowager Empress Is Destitute

(Special to The Guardian) PETROGRAD, April 12.—The Dowager Empress applied to the Bolshevik Government for assistance early in March, declaring she was destitute. She is the widow of the Russian Emperor Alexander Third and sister of Dowager Queen Alexandra of Great Britain. She is the daughter of the late King Christian IX. of Denmark.
