Rangers Open Season By Drubbing Toronto 4-1; Kampman's Penalty Costly

TORONTO, Nov. 3 (CP)—Two goals by the chivalrous Walter Kampman and one by Babe Pratt and another by the hero and hero of opening novelties of the National Hockey League.

Kampman was serving the penalty for his hockey past as Babe Pratt led New York Rangers to a 4-1 victory over Toronto Maple Leafs here Saturday night.

Pratt scored what proved to be the winning goal with only 83 seconds of play remaining, his mates scoring two more for good measure.

Kampman was chased for spilling the puck two minutes and 45 seconds from the final whistle. Forty-two seconds later he saw Pratt take a New York power play by hitting the puck past the Toronto net.

Pratt scored another before Bingo returned. The final New York goal—scored by Phil Watson—came at 19:50.

The first period ended with the Toronto lead 1-0.

Less than two minutes after Premier Mervyn Hurn of Ontario had off the puck, Ranger Alex Gaudin skated the puck past Truk Broda on a play with the Colville brothers—Neil and Mac.

The Leafs took the offensive and camped the Rangers for the balance of the period, their efforts going unrewarded when Gordie Drillon scored on a pass from Wally Sawonick.

Five Teams Removed From Unbeaten List

NEW YORK, Nov. 3 (AP)—Northwestern, Clemson, Navy, Detroit and Kentucky were removed from football's unbeaten class Saturday as Minnesota roared a new challenge to the Western Conference and the United States college gridirons in general.

Just 14 unbeaten teams were left in the unbeaten records and three of them had been tied. In the East, Cornell, Boston College, Penn State, Lafayette and Georgetown all had perfect records, as did Minnesota, Notre Dame and Michigan (which was idle Saturday) in the Mid-West; Texas A. and M. in the Southwest; Tennessee in the South; and Stanford in the Far West. Tied but unbeaten were Southern Methodist, Mississippi State and Texas Tech.

Minnesota struck Northwestern on the list, winning 13-12 before 48,000.

Canadiens Surprise Fans By Playing 1-1 Draw With Burly Boston Bruins

FORUM, MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 3 (CP)—Montreal Canadiens, miffed over from the goal out, tonight served up a delightful surprise for 11,780 fans, largest crowd of a half dozen seasons in Montreal, by holding Boston Bruins to 1-1 overtime tie in the opening game locally of the new National Hockey League season.

With eight new men in the lineup, some of them youngsters only 19 and 20 years of age, the Canadiens took the lead on a goal in the second period by Hector (Toe) Blake, and only relinquished it late in the third period when Milt Schmidt pushed the puck by goal-keeper Bert Gardiner from a scramble.

The brightest star for Canadiens was Gardiner, who turned in at least a half dozen remarkable saves in his first start as an N.H.L. regular. Gardiner, purchased last spring from Philadelphia Ramblers, has been up in the big show before, but substituting in the New York Ranger nets for Dave Kerr in the past.

Besides Gardiner and Alex Sing-bush who assisted on Blake's goal the other new men to Canadiens were Defencemen Ken Reardon, Wings Joe Benoit, Jack Adams, and Centres Murph Chamberlain, Johnny Quilty and Elmer Lach.

Riders In First Place

MONTREAL, Nov. 3 (CP)—Ottawa Rough Riders took an undisputed lead in the Interprovincial Rugby Union Saturday by taming the Montreal Club 7-4 while the second-place Toronto Argonauts lost a 5-0 decision to Hamilton Tigers.

Deep Shelters For All Seen Impractical

LONDON, Nov. 3 (CP)—Herbert Morrison, Minister of Home Security, told Britons in a broadcast tonight that deep air raid shelters for all are "beyond the bounds of practical possibility" and appealed to them to maintain the will to "take risks in freedom's cause."

Mr. Morrison excused himself for reaching the same decision after three weeks in office of his predecessor, Sir John Anderson, on the grounds of time, expense and the need for materials in "active defence."

A certain amount of deep shelter will be provided by extending the tunnelling of London's subways and elsewhere in the country where the terrain makes digging relatively easy, Mr. Morrison said. This, he added, will constitute only a fraction of the total shelter and in any event it cannot be finished until the end of the winter.

He outlined this program:

1. Building of more Anderson shelters—expensive corrugated iron huts which erdies asial because they are not proof against a direct hit.
2. Opening of private basement shelters where feasible.
3. Increasing use of floors above the ground as well as basements in certain types of strong modern buildings.
4. Installation of nearly 1,750,000 bucks now on order for subways and inauguration of a ticket system to abolish queues.
