THE "EXAMINER" AND PROHIBITION.

Since our last reference to the subject the Examiner has continued to denounce the Prohibitory Law characterising it as "a fraudulent humbug." Now inasmuch as this law was adopted by the unanimous vote of both parties, it becomes clear that the Examiner is denouncing the representative men of its own party for having supported the fraud. There can be no escape from this conclusion. It they supported a fraud knowing it to be such then they are guilty of perpetrating a fraud upon their constituents and the country. If they voted for it unwittingly it is a sad commentary upon their intelligence that not one man in fourteen could discover the fraud which is so clear and palpable to the Examiner.

Behind the Examiner's attitude with respect to the Prohibitory Law lies a very important consideration. The temperance people of Prince Edward Island have shown themselves very desirous to have a prohibitory law placed on the statute book. But they are even more desirous that the law when enacted shall be enforced with honest diligence and strictness. One of the questions they will naturally ask themselves at the coming provincial election will be, Which of the two parties will be most likely, if in power, to honestly enforce the Prohibitory Law? The Government of the day stands pledged to enforce the Law. The Examiner is doing its utmost to discredit the law, and by so much make it more difficult to be enforced.

Either the Examiner speaks for its party in this matter or it most grossly misrepresents that party. It may select whichever horn of the dilemma it chooses. But what sincere prohibitionist would willingly trust the enforcement of the law to a party made up of men who declare the law to be "a fraud and a sham" and "a fraudulent humbug"? We sincerely trust that the Conservative party in this Province is better than its organ; that the organ bears false witness against its party in this matter of prohibition. None the less the fact remains that the Examiner is doing its utmost to show to the temperance electors that it would be simply ruinous to prohibition were that party entrusted with the enforcement of the Prohibitory law.

The Examiner not only abuses the Prohibitory Law, but it claims to have discovered a hole in the License Act through which the saloon men may crawl to sell on certain nights of the week on which it was supposed the law forbade the traffic. We fail to see that there is anything in its marvellous discovery. But there can be no mistaking the motive. It is no love for temperance and prohibition that thus points out how legal restriction may be evaded.

Mr. W. E. Dawson, posing as a dear lover of prohibition, sought to prejudice the Methodist Conference against the Island Prohibitory Law. Our recollection of Mayor Dawson in the days of the Scott Act leads us to think that his love for prohibition is about on a par—or rather about as much below par, as is the Examiner's.
