EDITORIAL NOTES.

There is no doubt a serious quarrel between Sir Charles Tupper and the late Conservative organiser, Mr. Birmingham. But we fail to see any good reason why the elections from 1882 to 1896 should not all be inquired into by the Commission about to be appointed, if specific charges should be made by so prominent an electioneering agent as Mr. Birmingham has been during all these years. The Examiner calls Mr. Birmingham's references to these elections an "impudent threat." What the people desire and have a right to know is how far the system of corruption in elections has been carried, not by one party, but by both parties. Of course each party is a little more than willing to investigate the wrong-doing of the opposing party. Such a partial exposure would never lead to the radical and complete remedy which honest electors of both parties must desire.

In these days when we have frequent occasions for loyal demonstrations—and we hope to have other similar occasions in the near future—a common and appropriate emblem of the patriotic feeling is the national flag flung to the breeze. At such times we see the Provincial Building, the City Hall, the Market, and scores of other edifices public and private decorated with the national colors. One of our principal public buildings on such occasions always looks naked and cold by contrast. We refer to the Court House. The absence of the flag from that building on public holidays and other times of general joy, we are assured is not due to want of loyalty on the part of the Judges or officers of the Courts, but simply to the want of a flag-staff and a flag. Surely, after all these years, it is high time the want should be supplied. There is nothing British that we are prouder of than our British Courts. Hereafter we hope to see the British flag flying above the Court House. Who will move in the matter?

LETTER FROM S. AFRICA

GREEN POINT CAMP, Cape Town S. A. April 20.

DEAR FATHER AND MOTHER.—This is Sunday and I have a chance to write and I am taking it so every time I get a chance I write you a letter. We are having a fine time out here and we can say we were in active service as we kept guard over the Boers for 26 hours. There was between 16 and 1800 prisoners and I can tell we were paid quite a compliment from Sir Forster Walker. He told us we were the best mounted guard that had been on guard yet, and that was quite a thing. We had our pictures taken in camp life with our cook right in the centre of us with his pot and all, and there was also an Islander with us named Dan McKenzie and he had his wife and child with him. They have been very kind to us ever since we came here and had all the Island boys to their house to dinner one day. I have just got in from church parade and the service was a fine one. It was the St. Andrew's Church—each can march to his own church if he wants to. The heat here is temperate in the day time but it is very cold at night. When we get the pictures I will send you one. We got on a 12 mile march to-morrow. Quite a lot of Boer prisoners came in last night. We Canadians are thought a lot of out here around the Cape. I am looking out for letters from home to-morrow as we get a mail every Tuesday and Friday. We get the mail all right here but when we go to the front it won't be so regular. I don't expect by all accounts to see it at all. I went out to see Cecil Rhodes' place and it is fine. You see all the wild beasts of Africa, for he has them all in his park and you can see them free of charge. His park is beautifully laid off and is situated about 1500 feet above the sea level and right under a big mountain. I like camp life well and am getting as fat as can be. The silver leaf in Fred's letter is for you and this is the only place in the world that they grow. When you get it write
