Children's Fund Aims At Aiding 230 Million

LAKE SUCCESS, Nov. 14—(CP)—In a home for mutilated children on the outskirts of Rome, blind, amputee little Italo Renzetti talks of the future during a pause in his study of Braille with his tongue: "I'll be a musician. I'll play a flute. My tongue is useful."

On the other side of the world, in the tiny native villages of New Guinea, north of Australia, the children donate their pennies to what they call their piggin English, a "sing-a-long" of the 230,000 children in Europe and Asia — who along with Italo need food and clothing.

The Italian children's home and the New Guinea villages are two extremes of the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund, centered here at United Nations headquarters.

The New Guinea youngsters pennies add to the total private donations from Australians of some \$1,370,000 to the United Nations appeal for children, which is conducting a world-wide campaign for non-government funds to be used by U.N.I.C.E.F.

Canadians, the U.N.A.C. announced this week, have made the largest private contribution—\$1,582,000—of any of the 50 countries involved. United States citizens have raised only \$1,235,291 of their \$20,000,000 goal for the appeal. The world total collected for U.N.A.C. is some \$22,000,000.

However, the United States Government has pledged up to \$100,000 to U.N.I.C.E.F. on the basis of matching every \$28 pledged by other Governments with \$72 from the United States Government. The Canadian Government has pledged \$5,200,000 to the governmental fund.

U.N.I.C.E.F. was established in 1946 by a unanimous vote of the United Nations General Assembly

Scout News and Notices

A report from Japan states that 40 courses for Boy Scout Leaders have been held this year.

Sir Henry Gurney, K.C.M.G., the new Governor, has accepted the appointment of Chief Scout of the Federation of Malaya.

Hearing of the shortage of suitable staff-wood on the Prairies, Boy Scouts of Victoria on Vancouver Island, who were at camp this year have each cut a staff and forwarded it to Provincial Scout Headquarters in Regina as a gift to Saskatchewan Scouts.

The Boy Scouts Association of Britain has been granted 1,245,000 clothing coupons by the Board of Trade to allow uniformed members of the Movement to replace parts of uniforms and to assist towards the provision of uniforms for new recruits.

As a Community Good Turn, Boy Scouts of Zion Troop in Yarmouth, N. S., have removed thousands of nails from streets and highways during recent months. As a community service the Scouts, when on hikes along the main highway, on country roads and on city streets, picked up nails in all shapes and sizes. It is estimated that hundreds of motorists and cyclists benefitted from their good turn.

American Boy Scouts of Troop 29, which attended the World Scout Jamboree in France in 1947, have befriended a young Czechoslovakian Scout who recently came to the U. S. By each contributing \$20, the American Scouts have provided their brother Scout from Czechoslovakia with a university scholarship including full four-year board, room and tuition.

Teachers' Federation Board of Governors Holds Meeting

At a meeting of the Board of Governors of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation which was held in the auditorium of Prince of Wales College on Saturday, November 13, Mr. J. R. Murphy of Summerside was acclaimed as the president for the ensuing year. Other members of the newly elected executive were: First Vice-President — Lt.-Col. W. J. MacDonald; Second Vice-President — Miss Vera O. Simpson; Recording Secretary — Mr. Arnold Hierarchy; Secretary — J. A. S. Williams; Publicity Director — Mr. Millar MacFadyen.

The minutes of the meeting were adopted as read by the recording secretary — Miss Estelle Bowness.

The retiring president, Mr. Daniel MacDonald, outlined in his report the duties of the individual members outlined: Salaries and pensions, Federal aid to education, contracts between teachers and the school boards, and teaching in rural areas.

Miss Zeida MacLeod and Mrs. Gertrude Whiteway were appointed to the board of governors to fill vacancies in Uigg centre.

Mr. J. A. S. Williams, Recording Secretary, gave a comprehensive report of the year's finances.

An interesting account of the C.C.F. Conference was presented by Mr. J. R. Murphy. He summarized the speeches of various speakers some of whom were: Dr. K. S. Cunningham, Director of Educational Research; Hon. L. B. Pearson; Hon. John Bracken, and Hon. Brooke Claxton.

Regret was expressed regarding the resignation of Miss Alice Fraser as chairman of the Convention Program Committee. Her report was read by Mr. Millar MacFadyen.

A report on the work of the Advisory Council of Education embraced suggestions and plans on vocational education, curriculum, textbooks, school attendance, school improvement and teacher recruitment.

Discussions took place on resolutions concerning salaries and pensions, revision of the course studies, classification of school districts on basis of number of children of school age in the district.
