half a one of salt. And in a second bowl beat three eggs until light. Then you add the flour mixture and beaten eggs alternately to the butter and sugar. You have to beat it quite well, so it's wise to have nothing else on your mind when you plan to make one! Add a teaspoon of flavoring, supposed to be almond, but it may be any one that you fancy, then the flour—fruit—a pound of raisins—and a cup of chopped nuts and candied cherries mixed and now add a half cup of warm milk and beat it all together—and there you have it! It does best in a round cake tin and it should be baked in a moderate oven an hour and a half to two hours. Think you can remember the recipe? Well, if you can't just call me up and I'll tell you." If as she told us, she was obliged to suspend the mixing more than once "to catch sight" of her younger lad about the yard at the time, as I said it came from the pan light yet rich and tasteful.
