SAD DROWNING NEAR TORONTO

MONTREAL, August 5.—(Special)—A double drowning tragedy took place at Verriens on Sunday, when Shirley Davidson, son of Justice Davidson and Miss Ellen Hingston, daughter of the late Mr. Wm. Hingston, were drowned.

CHINKS BATTLE IN BOSTON STREET

New York Band, Armed With Big Revolvers Swooped Down Upon Their Fellow Countrymen, Killing Three and Wounding Seven

BOSTON, Aug. 4.—Burning with hatred for their deadly enemies belonging to the rival Leong Tong, a band of New York Chinamen, numbering a dozen or more, and belonging to the notorious Hip Sing Tong, entered a narrow alley in Boston's Chinatown tonight and drawing 40 calibre revolvers opened fire with deadly aim upon half a hundred Chinamen seated in easy chairs up and down the alley smoking their pipes and conversing.

JAPS MIX IT UP WITH KOREANS

SEOUL, Aug. 3.—Unverified official returns from yesterday morning's conflict, between Japanese troops and the first battalion of the First Shina Regiment, give the number of killed and wounded as sixty Koreans and forty Japanese. About 3,000 men were dispersed, marched without arms through the parade grounds, where according to rank, they received gratuities ranging from 25 yen to 80 yen.
