added to the present board. Dr. G. Ennis Smith was made Hon. President of the Association by a unanimous vote.

A meeting of the directors was held immediately after the annual meeting and the provisional officers were re-elected as follows: President, Mr. J. R. Forbes; Vice-President, Mr. Roy Duggan; Secretary Treasurer, Dr. L. N. Callbeck.

Dr. G. Ennis Smith addressed the members at the afternoon meeting on the subject of introducing mink for experimental purposes at the experimental fox farm. For some time Dr. Smith has been endeavoring to interest the Dept. of Agriculture at Ottawa to have mink at the Experimental Station. The Dept. is now taking a keen interest in the breeding of mink and have started operations. Fifteen acres of land has been obtained for mink ranching, eight acres of which have been donated by the Dominion Government. As time goes on experiments will be made with other animals. It is not the intention of the Government to ask the mink breeders to do as much as the fox breeders had done towards the establishing of the experimental ranch, as the Association was only in its infancy, but the Department would appreciate donations of mink for experimental purposes from any members of the Association. This would put the Department in good standing and will show that the breeders feel the need for such work.

Mr. L. B. Crue felt that it was the opinion of all present that there was a great necessity for the research work in connection with the mink raising as there was a large mortality among mink and the members would be very willing to handle animals for this purpose. They all appreciated very much Dr. Smith's splendid efforts on their behalf in this important matter. The President stated that Nova Scotia and New Brunswick mink breeders were keenly interested in the movements of the Association. Mr. Saunders brought to the attention of the meeting a report that a United States concern had the intention of starting a mink ranch on P. E. I. He considered that if United States mink were ranched here, it would be very detrimental to the Island mink business, as our mink had an enviable reputation. Canadian mink bring \$60 against \$20 for American mink. He urged the Island breeders to get together and endeavor to have the Government place a prohibitive duty on United States mink. This should be attended to without delay to safeguard the Island mink business. Other speakers spoke strongly on this matter, it being stressed that the United States do not hesitate to put prohibitive duties against Canadian products and we should treat them in a like manner. It was pointed out by the President that although it was most gratifying to have the act of incorporation, the breeders difficulties were still ahead and it was just in such matters as this that all must unite and urge upon the Government at an early date to safeguard our mink business by legislation. It is of great importance that some system of registration of mink should be devised. In the opinion of Dr. Smith, an electric tattoo might be used.

ins, both Liberal members for the dual constituency of Queens and Mr. A. E. MacLean, Liberal member for Prince are mentioned for cabinet appointment. Another name prominently associated with the appointment is that of Dr. Cyrus MacMillan a professor at McGill University and formerly of Prince Edward Island. Dr. MacMillan was a member of the Atlantic Fisheries Commission.

Mr. Sinclair was Minister without portfolio in the administration of Premier King from 1921 to 1925.

There is a senatorial vacancy however for Prince Edward Island caused by the death of Senator B. C. Prowse. In February last and it is possible Mr. Sinclair may be appointed to the upper chamber.

Creation of a separate Department of Fisheries with a Minister and Deputy presiding at its head was recommended by the Duncan Royal Commission which investigated conditions in the Maritime Provinces back in 1925 and 1926.

About a year ago Mr. W. A. Found was appointed as Deputy Minister of Fisheries to carry on such duties under the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Hon. J. A. Cardin. Under the proposed legislation Mr. Cardin will devote his ministerial energies to Marine.

Another legislative proposal bearing on Fisheries is for the transfer to the new Department of Fisheries of the work of inspection of fish oils used for manufacturing purposes, tempering of steel and the like. This task is now being performed by the Department of Agriculture under the Inspection and Sale Act.

Notice of a resolution preliminary to the introduction of a bill to put this proposal into effect is given today by Mr. Cardin.

It is contemplated also to increase from 5 to 7 the number of appointments which may be made by the Minister of Fisheries to the Biological Board of Canada. Originally constituted entirely of scientific men the Board is in addition now composed of one representative each of fisheries on the Atlantic and Pacific Coasts and two departmental officials. Universities are entitled to appoint further scientific representatives. The purpose of the change is to give an additional representative to the fisheries industry of both British Columbia and the Maritime Provinces.

whole. He also objected to the provision in the agreement for Federal control of the national parks.

Old Provinces Furnished the Money.

The four original provinces, said Col. Thomas Cantley, (Cons., Picton), namely Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, had purchased Prince Ruperts Land which now makes up the prairie provinces, from the Hudson Bay Company for \$1,460,000. The old provinces had furnished this money, doubtlessly out of continuous revenues. The Maritime Provinces did not object to the natural resources of the new provinces being returned to them. Nova Scotia made no claim to the ownership of such lands or other resources, but in view of the fact that it had helped pay this amount, it was entitled to some consideration. He hoped that some, not too distant date, the Maritime Provinces should be recompensed for this out of the resources of Canada as a whole.

Bill Important to Whole Dominion.

Hon. R. B. Bennett, Conservative leader, said that the bill now before the House was of great importance, not only to the Province of Alberta, but to the entire Dominion. Twenty-five years ago the Liberal government of Ottawa, had placed itself on record as unequivocally opposed to giving the new provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta their lands and resources. The Conservative party at that time took the position that these territories could not be provinces within the meaning of the constitution unless they had their lands. The present bills were the result of twenty-five years of consistent efforts to obtain these resources.

At first the Liberal ministers from Ottawa were able to convince the people of those two provinces, Mr. Bennett said, that it would be better to have the lands vested in the Dominion and subsequent elections supported that view. However, years went by, a change came over the people in those two provinces as reflected in government resolutions from time to time.

Those who had consistently supported the return of the natural resources to the western provinces were happy to think that they had lived to see the day when Liberals stood up and moved for such action, said Mr. Bennett. He stated that the government of Sir Robert Borden, when returned to power in 1911, was obligated to the return of the natural resources. In the year 1913, Sir Robert's government had attempted to deal with the matter. Unfortunately there were Liberal governments in the three western provinces as well as in Nova Scotia, and this made successful negotiations difficult.

"The government would not give then a five-cent-piece," called a Liberal member.

Survivors of First Prince Co. Militia Reg.

Mr. Thomas L. Ramsay, of Kensington, formerly of Beach Point, has kindly left with us, for our perusal and comment, four of the Muster Rolls of the ten companies which composed the First Prince County Regiment of Militia. Although they are dated 1868, thus being 62 years old, these interesting documents are in a most excellent state of preservation and each one bears the signature of the Captain in command of the company. Mr. Ramsay's grandfather, Lieut-Colonel Donald Ramsay, of Beach Point, was then the Commandant of the Regiment and under him was Major Norman MacLeod Ramsay (1853). The Muster Rolls under review all bear date of June, 1868, and are for Companies 7, 8, 9 and 10.

That of Company No. 7, Malpeque, of which Captain Donald S. MacLellan was in command, bears 41 names; and of them only one, Mr. John S. MacLellan, of Indian River, is now living.

Company No. 8, New Annan, mustered 91 on June 25th, 1868, under command of Captain William Jamieson and of that gallant band only one is now living, Mr. William MacMurdo, esteemed Summerside citizen. Mr. Robert Neill, a native of Kelvin, whose name appears as No. 53 on that roll, left the Island in 1876 and died in March last year in California at the age of 77 years, having amassed there an enormous estate of over \$2,500,000, as recorded in our columns just about a year ago. Amongst beneficiaries under his will, to the extent of between \$25,000 and \$30,000, were the following nephews and nieces:—Mr. Norman MacMurdo, Mr. James Clark and Mrs. Jessie Clark, of Bequeque and Mrs. Hattie MacLean, of Lot 16.

On the Muster Roll of Company No. 9, Kensington, under Captain Thomas H. Sims, 71 names appear. Of those then answering three are now living, namely:—Mr. James Parsons, of Kensington; Mr. Thomas Donahue, of Kensington, and Mr. Thomas Bryenton (spelled on the Roll Bryenton) of Spring Valley.

Sixty-three answered the Roll Call of No. 10 Company, Kensington, commanded by Captain John Glover, and one of them, Mr. Andrew Bowness of Kensington, died only a few months ago. Of the others three are now living. They are Mr. John Glover, now an esteemed resident of Summerside, and who on the Muster of June 26th, 1868, was marked "sick;" Mr. Anthony Lockhart, of Coleman and Mr. Thomas Paynter (spelled Painter on the Roll) now residing in New Brunswick—pioneer.

Secretary's Report

The Secretary Treasurer, Dr. L. M. Callbeck, then read the minutes of various meetings of the executive since that momentous day, November 27th last, when thirty mink breeders met at Summerside and formed themselves into the P. E. Island Mink Breeders' Association and the following officers were elected: President, Mr. J. R. Forbes; Vice-President, Mr. Roy Duggan; Secretary Treasurer, Dr. L. M. Callbeck; Directors, Messrs. George E. Brown, John E. Cousins, E. A. Ferguson and Nelson Sheen.

Dr. Callbeck reports that he had been in communication with the Trade Commissioner of Europe regarding the P. E. Island mink industry. The Trade and Commerce Department at Ottawa wrote to him later that their European Trade Commission would be glad to assist the Association in putting its subject matter in the hands of the proper officials. The Secretary had submitted in detail the purpose of the organization and the object of Europeans being duped by high pressure salesmen. He (the Secretary) had sent
