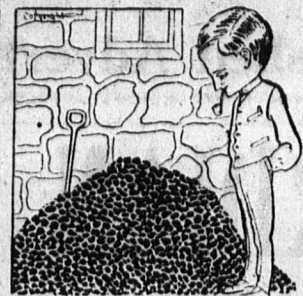

ROYAL WELCOME TO RETURNED HERO

Summerside did honor last night to Pte. Thomas Doucette, the first returned hero belonging to this town. Pte. Doucette was met at the steamer by the Mayor and members of the Recruiting Committee and formally welcomed. The Summerside Band was in attendance and played a number of appropriate selections.

The soldier was driven to The Town Hall which was too small to accommodate the large crowd that gathered, and the welcome which consisted of short addresses by his Worship Mayor Jardine, Mr. A. S. McKay, chairman Recruiting Committee and others.

Pte. Doucette is a son of Mr. Frank Doucette of Summerside. He enlisted for garrison duty at Halifax shortly after the outbreak of the war. When the 26th Battalion was being recruited, he with several of his comrades joined that battalion. He landed in England in June 1915 and went to the front about the middle of September going into the trenches almost immediately on arrival.

He was almost continuously in the firing zone around Ypres until early in March, when he was gassed. Previous to this, on November 4th, he was one of the platoon who took part in the famous crater fight in which so

CHEAP PAPER AND PRESS

Half-penny Newspapers Tripled Sales in Short Period

The threatened shortage of paper in England brings to notice the rapidly increasing requirements in paper making materials. Besides wood pulp, something like a million and a half tons of rags, straw, and waste paper are also used to supply the requirements in paper. It was the introduction of wood pulp in paper making that so cheapened the material as to make the half-penny newspaper possible. Indeed, it is said that the circulation of English newspapers tripled between the years 1875-1885, owing to the cheapening of paper following the introduction of wood pulp.
