Destructive Fire Causes \$150,000 Damage in Alta.

By Guardian's Special Wire) FORT MCMURRAY, July 18—The populace of this little Northern Alberta settlement counted damages of \$150,000 tonight and surveyed the blackened remains of half the town, swept by flames early today. The blaze broke out in a small building adjacent to the Franklin Hotel, and rapidly swept through the hotel, and seven other buildings including the government telegraph office, all situated on one side of Main Street. A volunteer bucket brigade was formed and the fire held in check until it burned itself out. Commotion with outside was maintained by temporary connection made in the radio office. Fort McMurray is about 200 miles north of Edmonton.

Beer By The Glass Before End Of Week

By Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, July 18—Ontario will not be flooded with beer when the new liquor law comes into actual operation but before the end of this week citizens of some parts of the province at least will be able legally to buy and drink a glass of beer in public for the first time in 117 years. Premier Mitchell F. Hepburn today announced beer would go on sale in standard hotels before the end of the week but at the same time emphasized the province would not be deluged with the popular beverage. The government and the liquor commission propose to proceed cautiously and it is likely licenses will be issued sparingly at first.
