Nursing and National Health

VII.—REGISTRATION OF NURSES

It was not until the latter part of the nineteenth century that the training of nurses began to take on the characteristics of education on a professional level. Nurses came to realize that, without legal recognition, their future and the future of training schools would be insecure. It was foreseen that measures to ensure the maintenance of standards of nursing preparation would be essential if the quality of nursing care available to the public were to be maintained and improved. Accordingly, nurses' associations all over the world what proved to be a prolonged struggle to secure nurse registration. Acts. Cape Colony in South Africa passed the first law. Nova Scotia was the first Canadian province to secure registration. In 1910. The legislature in all of the provinces had passed similar Acts by 1922.

The registration of nurses is designed to protect the public against incompetent and fraudulent persons practicing as nurses and the well-qualified nurses against those who are unprepared. With few exceptions, registration acts are permissive, that is, they protect the use of the title "Registered Nurse" but do not require that a nurse must be registered before she may work. Manitoba has recently passed a mandatory act, which would require registration or licensing of all who nurse the sick for hire. Similar legislation is being sought by Registered Nurses Associations in other provinces to further increase the protection of the public.

The registration acts of all Canadian provinces have several common features. Each provides for the appointment of an administrative body, a board of examiners, an executive officer or officers. Each outlines minimum general education and nursing education requirements for candidates for registration. On the other hand considerable variations in standards exist and frequently create difficulties for nurses who wish to move from one province to another. In order to alleviate the difficulties encountered by nurses applying for reciprocal registration, the Canadian Nurses Association is endeavouring to effect a greater degree of uniformity in requirements for entrance to schools of nursing and in standards of nursing education within the schools. It also is studying the possibility of national registration examinations. These measures would do much to facilitate reciprocal registration between provinces.

There are at present approximately 22,000 registered nurses in Canada. Registration is a requirement for enrolment in the Armed Forces, for Civil Service and UNRRA appointments. NEXT WEEK:—Development of University Schools of Nursing.
