### Fine Weather Attends Big Reunion Of Alumni

#### St. Dunstan's College Scene of Celebration On Occasion Of 75th Anniversary.—Rev. J. A. Murphy Awarded Degree Of Doctor Of Theology By Laval University—Many Fine Addresses Heard.

On the beautiful campus of St. Dunstan's University and on the same spot where, seventy-five years ago, a little college opened her doors to a student body of three, hundreds of graduates yesterday celebrated the birth of their Alma Mater. In the convivial atmosphere of class reunions and college yells, the occasion is indeed a memorable one with graduates attending the festivities from all over the North American continent. On the University grounds yesterday morning at 10 o'clock, Pontifical High Mass was celebrated by His Lordship Bishop Kelley, of Oklahoma. In the sanctuary were seated His Lordship Bishop Boyle, of Pittsburgh, Bishop Morrison of Antigonish, Rt. Rev. J. C. McGuigan, Edmonton and Sir George Hennessey and Sir Charles Dalton in robes of papal knights.

The following clergy officiated: Celebrant, His Lordship Bishop Kelley; High Priest, Right Rev. Monsignor J. C. McLean; Deacons of Honor, Rev. M. Monaghan, Rev. L. MacDonald, died but a few years ago, were the first to enter. As we view this unpretentious opening we can not help but admire the vision, the faith and the courage of those men who founded this University.

"St. Dunstan's has since laboured under great difficulties. Our endowment is confined almost entirely to maintenance. Dalton Hall stands as a mark of generosity and zeal for education of one of Prince Edward Island's greatest benefactors—Sir Charles Dalton. But, what of the future? We cannot afford to stand still. We must have highly qualified teachers, more scientific equipment and more library facilities. St. Dunstan's must extend her sphere of usefulness." Dr. Murphy declared that since her foundation, St. Dunstan's has provided over 300 young men for the priesthood.

#### Eugene Lafleur Arbitrator In I'm Alone Case

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 7.—Canada has elected Eugene Lafleur, D. C. L., LL. D., K. C., eminent counsel of Montreal, as Canadian arbitrator in the I'm Alone case. The government of the United States has appointed Willis Van Devanter, associate justice of the Supreme Court of the United States as its member. Announcement of the selections was made simultaneously in Ottawa and Washington this evening.

At the same time, the Department of External Affairs at Ottawa announced that John E. Read, K. C., of the Nova Scotia bar and legal advisor of the department, had been appointed Canadian agent in the case. Counsel for the Dominion of Canada in the case are W. N. Tilley, K. #### LIQUOR SALES OVER HUNDRED MILLIONS

#### Figures On Liquor Traffic In Canada Released By Dominion Bureau Of Statistics.

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 7.—Liquor sales in 1928 through provincial government commissions totalled \$107,694,384, rather more than \$10 per capita over all Canada. Figures on the liquor traffic in Canada, covering sales in eight of Canada's nine provinces were released today by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. Government control is in effect in all provinces excepting Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia.

The total government revenue from the liquor traffic during 1928 amounted to \$72,560,501. Of this amount \$59,805,291 rolled into dominion coffers while the remainder \$22,855,201, was provincial revenues. Actually the latter figure does not include all profits of liquor control boards. Less than one third of Saskatchewan's total liquor board revenue appears under ordinary revenue, while more than \$400,000 distributed to municipalities, does not show in British Columbia's total.

Following the meeting of the Alumni Association of St. Dunstan's University yesterday afternoon, the amount of \$30,000 was subscribed towards an endowment fund for University activities. Contributions were still coming in, and it is hoped that the amount will reach a suggested objective of \$100,000.

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#### BRITISH TROOPS WILL BE WITHDRAWN

#### Numerous Concessions Granted Egypt Under New Pact.

LONDON, Aug. 7.—British military occupation of Egypt, except for the Suez Canal zone, is abandoned and other important and far-reaching reforms agreed to in the new Anglo-Egyptian draft treaty, details of which were issued today by the foreign office. The proposals are a great advance on anything hitherto offered as settlement of the Anglo-Egyptian problem, being considered even more favorable than was the draft treaty of 1927, which was rejected by the Egyptian parliament under the influence of the followers of the nationalist leader Zaghloul Pasha.

The agreement which Right Hon. Arthur Henderson, Foreign Secretary, has negotiated with the Egyptian premier, Mahmoud, in a general way follows the lines of the abortive treaty of two years ago, but makes important concessions to Egypt. The British occupation will cease and British troops will be withdrawn to the Suez Canal zone. The British government will use its influence to induce other powers to consent to the abolition of the capitulations or extraterritorial right and will assist Egypt to become a member of the League of Nations.

Further, Great Britain recognizes that the protection of foreigners in Egypt is a matter devolving solely upon the Egyptian government. The protection of minorities was one of the four "reserved" points by the British government two years ago, but it is now admitted that this will be exclusively the concern of the Egyptian government. The British inspector-general of the Egyptian army will cease to function, completely, and all British personnel will be withdrawn from the Egyptian forces.

#### Fatal Accident Near Summerside

#### Mr. Wallace Harding Thrown From Motorcycle And Dies Without Regaining Conscious- ness.

A shocking motor cycle accident happened last evening on the Linkletter Road, about a mile and a half from Summerside. At about 5.30 Mr. Wallace Harding, proprietor of Harding's Garage, Summerside, was riding on the road near the Rogers farm on a good speed when the front wheel of the machine struck a rock and Mr. Harding was thrown headlong.

The accident was witnessed by Mr. Leonard Rogers, who found Mr. Harding unconscious on the road where he fell. He at once telephoned for a doctor and the ambulance and the injured man was removed to the Prince County Hospital, where his injuries were found to consist of a compound fracture of the collar bone and numerous and very severe injuries to his head and arms. Mr. Harding was still unconscious at a late hour last night and the outlook for his recovery was considered very grave.

#### J. H. Thomas To Visit Canada

LONDON, Aug. 7.—There is a likelihood of an increase in the exports of Welsh anthracite to Canada amounting to 2,000,000 tons a year as a result of the forthcoming visit to the Dominion of Rt. Hon. J. H. Thomas, Minister of Employment, according to the Manchester Guardian today. The paper says there is a strong impression amounting almost to belief in certain business quarters, that Mr. Thomas will not content himself with enquiring into the possibility of Canada absorbing a substantial number of England's unemployed, but will investigate trade development prospects as well, with a view to relieving the coal and other depressed industries.

#### Tanker Afire

HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 7.—The tanker Mina Brae, was afire at anchor, off Canso Head tonight, according to a wireless message received here by C. S. Harvey of the Department of Marine and Fisheries on the steamer Spica. The crew has been taken off. The Mina Brae is a steamer of 2,566 tons. She sailed from Halifax for Dalhousie, N. B., with a cargo of gasoline.

#### AIR SERVICE INAUGURATED

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 7.—At 1.45 p. m. today the first daily air express service in Canada operating between Toronto and Hamilton, London and Windsor was inaugurated when a Fairchild cabin monoplane piloted by Capt. R. H. Bibby took off from the Canadian Airways field at Weston, for Hamilton.
