The Amendment To The Budget

As to the amendment submitted by Messrs H. D. McLean and Kennedy, the Government had two courses to pursue: (1) to demonstrate by reference to facts and figures that the statement set forth in it was a wrong one, or (2) to have it voted down by the brute force of their majority. They did the latter course. They did not attempt to show that the statement was in any way incorrect. The Premier, it is true attacked the Leader of the Opposition on the ground alleged that there was an unprecedented deficit at the end of 1919. His argument had as much to do with the statement and the conclusion set forth in the amendment as the absolute, undeniable fact that the present Government imposed last year "the heaviest taxes ever" and caused in the same year the largest expenditure of the people's money. It was mere "camouflage" employed to belud the point at issue. Not one of the Government's supporters even attempted to refute the statement set forth in the amendment. Consequently we conclude and the public will conclude—that that statement was correct. By the way the amendment has

Budget Debate Continued In the Legislature

Continued from Page One. was a grave problem and required attention. He believed that in some respects the gentlemen on the treasury have been sitting a little too tight. Small accounts should be settled with more promptitude. The road overseers in the country should be on the roads as soon as they are fit in order to get the work started early. This year the work of the overseers might be continued, though in order to curtail expenses as much as possible the Government should shorten up expenditures whenever they can. Mr. McLean could not conscientiously accuse the late Government of failing to make revenue and expenditures meet because they did not have the revenue to do so. He expressed satisfaction with the financial statement of the Government and trusted that next year it would be even better.

The amendment to the motion that the House go into supplies was put to a standing vote and lost. The following members voted in favor of it: Hon. A. E. Arsenault, Messrs. H. D. McLean, J. Neill and J. A. Dewar.

Budget Debate Continued In the Legislature

Continued from Page One. In connection with the amount for jails, Mr. J. D. Stewart wanted to know if any extra precautions had been taken for the security of prisoners in Queen's County Jail. Not long since some prisoners escaped, they were re-captured and escaped again this time for good. This was not creditable to the administration of Justice. It was said in connection with this matter that a certain prisoner was put in jail by the Probation Commission. Perhaps the Probation Commission which supplies many of the prisoners might be induced to bear some of the expense.

The Jail and Court House estimates being carried, the next items to be considered were those of the Agricultural Department.

MR. ARSENAULT asked the Commissioner of Agriculture how the salaries were being paid to his assistants, Messrs. Reid and Boulter in the office of his Department.

MR. LEA said the money was received through the Federal grant.

MR. ARSENAULT replied that the Government was very fortunate. The Federal authorities had been given no credit in the matter.

The Commissioner of Agriculture has instance the great things his Government has done in the establishment of the Agricultural school, the importation of lime-stone and live stock, school fairs, etc. He had no wish to detract from any credit due the Commissioner or

the Government in the matter, he said, but at the same time he wished to emphasize the fact that the Commissioner of Agriculture had not initiated any reform nor had he accomplished anything very much. He merely continued the good work initiated by the late government. The grant for the Technical School did not come in at the time the late Government were in power, therefore they could not take advantage of it. It had been discussed at the time, however, and initial steps were taken as early as 1917 at the Inter-provincial conference at Ottawa. This was really the beginning of the Technical Education grant, and was what led to the establishment of the Technical school in the Province. The late Government did not have the advantage of this grant, but they carried on Agricultural education, nevertheless. They gave short and long courses in Agricultural subjects, they inaugurated the Domestic Science School, the teaching of rural science in schools and the system of underdrainage. This latter system, Mr. Arsenault continued, has been a great benefit to the Province, as the Commissioner himself will admit. The speaker believed that it would be a good investment on the part of the Government to get a second

ditcher, as there is a great demand for it. The Commissioner of Agriculture has been eulogized for "making two blades of grass grow where only one grew before. Let him interest himself in this project, and let him create one acre of arable land where there was none before. Mr. Arsenault believed that the ditcher, even if operated at a loss, would be an advisable purchase. He urged strongly the necessity of lower freight rates on fertilizers and the further development of underdrainage. The House took recess until 3 p. m.
