PREMIER OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND Executive Council Chamber Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, August 31st, 1940.

REPLY TO THE PREMIER Speaking in reply to the Premier His Excellency in the name of myself I thank you most cordially for your loyal and dutiful address...

"Seventy-six years ago, almost to the day, the convention met in this very place to discuss the union of the three Maritime Provinces, and out of that Convention sprang the idea of a Canada united under a single government. I am interested to know that this place and this very room may justly claim the birthplace of the Dominion."

"It is indeed appropriate that apart from the Province where I live, this should be the first I should visit in my official capacity, for shall always feel, in the heart of my mind, that I have throughout Canada, that I have started at the beginning... "There are some who will say that people who live in an island become detached in their ideas...

"The fact of the matter is that there are many advantages in living in an island such as yours. It produces a fine independence of spirit and gives you a community of interest, which is a sure protection against the extremes of wealth and poverty..."

"There is another thing for which Prince Edward Island is justly famed and that is its beauty and its rare charm. I am glad to think that year after year it offers to the eyes of the world a picture of countless thousands who live and toil in less favored surroundings..."

"Finally, it gives Princess Alice and myself a particular pleasure to be here because your Province has the name of her grandfather the Duke of Kent. I hope that though this may be our first visit, it will not be our last..."

Princess Alice was quite interested in the Girl Guides and Brownies who made up part of the Guard of Honour for as she was walking to the bandstand she stopped and talked to one of two of the girls and also to a rather shy little Brownie. After the reception His Excellency inspected the Boy Scouts and chartered the Royal Master W. A. Currie who had charge of the boys and also chatted informally for some minutes with Scouts and Cubs.

Princess Alice and Lady May Abel-Smith spent a few minutes chatting with the Guide Leaders and Brownies. Members of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire of Summerside were gathered in a body behind the Brownies.

The following address to Their Excellencies was read by Mayor John E. Campbell, the Right Honourable The Earl of Athlone, K.G., Governor General and Commander in Chief of the Dominion of Canada, and the Right Honourable Princess Alice, Countess of Athlone:

"In our assembling here today, we greet you as the representatives of the Most Gracious Majesty King George VI and Queen Elizabeth, who by their human interest, captivated the hearts of every Canadian from the Atlantic to the Pacific, when visiting this country last year. We exceedingly regret that the peaceful conditions which obtained at that time have given way to war in all its horrors. We would do homage to your excellencies today on this your first visit to our town, and with sincere appreciation we desire to receive you, we are honored and thrilled by your presence, as we recognize in you leaders in that Great Democracy upon which the sun never sets—the British Commonwealth of Nations.

Our earnest solicitation and prayer is that God will grant you unflinching courage and wisdom through these darkest days in the Empire's history. Thus, with a united faith may we persevere until victory is achieved, when the dragon of ungodliness banished from the earth. We will look forward to a future visit when victory is ours.

25 Killed In Crash Of Big Passenger Plane

Airliner Struck With Throttles Wide Open—Cause Of Accident Not Known.

Irwin, Associated Press Staff Writer) LOVETTSVILLE, Pa., Sept. 1—(AP)—A Pennsylvania central airliner crashed and exploded at the foot of the Blue Ridge Mountains near here Saturday, killing 25 persons including Ernest Lundeen, Farmer-Labor member of the United States Senate from Minnesota.

Airline officials said the plane apparently struck the ground with the throttles of both engines wide open but there was no clue as to what sent the giant airliner plummeting to the foot of the mountains during a cloud burst. It was the worst disaster in the history of United States commercial aviation.

(In Washington Harlow Branch, chairman of the Civil Aeronautics Board, said that public hearings would be ordered in a day or two to determine the cause of the accident. They will be conducted by Jerome Lederer, director of the board's safety bureau.)

Picture of Horror Today a bright sun beating down on the crash-scattered clover field disclosed a picture of incomparable horror. Virtually all of the bodies of the 25 persons who were killed, unofficial observers said, the passengers apparently were buckled in their seats and were literally cut in two by the impact.

J. H. (Slim) Carmichael, vice-president of the Pennsylvania State Police, and a former pilot on the same route, said apparently both engines were "wide open," but he would not estimate the speed of the plane on display. The only speaker was the Governor-General, who was introduced by Premier Campbell. In his introductory remarks Premier Campbell referred to the Royal connection of His Excellency and Princess Alice. His Excellency, in his opening remarks, stressed the appreciation of the wonderful welcome tendered him by the people of Prince Edward Island. He referred to the large number of flowers seen along the way to greet him and the other members of the vice-regal party.

He made special mention of the fine address read by the Premier and mayors of Charlottetown and Summerside. His Excellency was high in his praise of the kind and generous hospitality of the trees along the roadside, which he noticed on his trip to Summerside earlier in the day. He was surprised these green naturals did not have to be planted as in England. Another thing which interested him on the drive was the abundance of flowers seen along the way. He especially referred to the Golden Rod which is plentiful in the province. He said that the control of weeds and the things which will increase production in any farming country.

The Governor General stressed that in his opinion there is no more beautiful island like this if a tree was cut down it should be replaced by another.

He also referred to the characteristic trait of the people living on the island who refer to the mail coming from the mainland as "foreign mail." This raised the point of a "tight little island" and such a spirit as this stands a community in good stead in times of adversity.

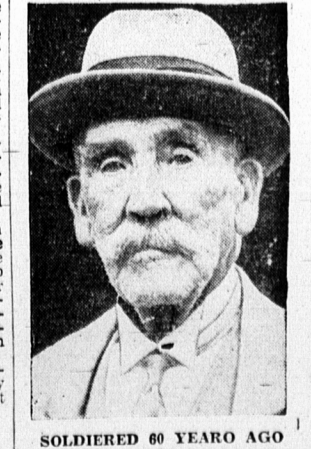
His Excellency referred to the early Scotch settlers of the province as "Jacobites" who left Scotland and said that these people have given to this part of the country and the parts of the Empire leadership that has stood for progress for many years.

He also referred to the visit of King George and Queen Elizabeth to the island over a year ago, and spoke of the pleasure they had received in visiting the island. Following his speech, a hearty applause was given by the dinner guests. After the dinner a reception was held and many guests were presented to the Governor General and Princess Alice.

During the dinner, Miss Kathleen Hornby's orchestra supplied the music. At the head table of the dinner, two framed Island water color views were presented to Her Excellency Princess Alice, and her daughter Lady May Abel-Smith, the entire work being that of Miss Helen A. Grant, of this city.

Following the reception the vice-regal party returned to the railway station, where they spent the night aboard their special train.
