ALBERTON BOARD OF TRADE MEETING

The Alberton and West Prince Board of Trade held its annual meeting in the office of James E. Birch, Alberton, on Wednesday 10th and was very largely attended and much interest taken. President John Agnew, Esq., was in the chair and he delivered the annual address. The officers for the ensuing year are:—John Agnew—President. J. A. McFadden—Vice President. Jas. F. Birch—Secretary. Council—L. F. White, Thos. Wilkinson, H. W. Turner, Dr. P. C. Murphy, W. R. McKie, F. L. Rogers, C. A. Woodman and J. P. Fielding. Arbitrators—B. Rogers, D. McLaughlin, T. Wilkinson, Jas. McGrath, George Tweedy, A. Ross, M.D., Rev. Dr. P. C. Gauthier, J. F. White, J. W. Waugh, J. J. Arsenault, A. F. Larkin and A. L. Purdy. Auditors—F. L. Rogers and W. R. McKie. John Agnew was appointed a member of the Council of the Maritime Board of Trade. Moved by P. C. Murphy, M. D., "That this Board endorse the resolution passed by Halifax Board asking Government for a bonus of \$5 per ton on all steel ships built in the Dominion. Motion seconded by George Tweedy and carried. A committee composed of A. J. McFadden, John Agnew and Jas. E. Birch was appointed to get up a prospectus and stock subscribed to purchase a steamer to ply between the north ports of N. B., Magdalen Islands and Alberton. A resolution was unanimously passed authorizing the President to telegraph Sir Wilfred Laurier and the Minister of Railways protesting the withdrawal of the express train and requesting that said train be immediately restored; and if not restored the President and Secretary were empowered to call indignation meetings throughout the county protesting the action of the authorities.

PLOT TO BLOW CZAR TO PIECES

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—A St. Petersburg despatch to The World says that for fear of an attempt on his life, the Czar will not come to St. Petersburg from Tsarskoe. Solo next Friday to take part in the annual ceremony of "Blessing the Waters" at the festival of the Epiphany. A quantity of dynamite, packed in two large boxes was found today hidden under the snow at the point where the Neva River is joined by the Ustsoora River. In the boxes were electric batteries and ingenious contrivances to cause an explosion whose force would have been disastrous for a short distance. Short wires ran in three directions from the boxes. The mine was planted near the Pallisen Paper Manufacturing many of the employees in which were particularly violent during the recent strike and rioting. The secret police are convinced that had they not found the dynamite it would have exploded when the Czar, accompanied by his kinsmen and the highest prelates and nobles approached the Neva for the solemn ceremony of blessing the waters.

OBITUARY.

There departed this life at the residence of her son, Archd. Campbell, De Sable on Tuesday the 16th inst., Elizabeth Blackie, relict of the late Roderick Campbell, at the advanced age of 90 years. Deceased was born at Horton, Nova Scotia on Dec. 12th, 1815. She was twice married, her first husband being Donald Fraser, Pictou, by whom she had one son and three daughters, W. J. Fraser, Charlottetown; Mrs. W. Morrison, Jamaica Plains, Mass., and late Mrs. Robert Sinclair, New Glasgow, N. S. Her second husband was John Doull by whom there was a family of five sons and one daughter, James F., New Glasgow, N. S.; John, Braintree, Mass., Chas. B., Carlisle, P. E. I.; Augustus, Nine Mile Creek; Daniel living in United States and Mrs. James Stilliker, Cape Traverse. She was the third marriage there were two sons, Archibald Campbell of De Sable, with whom deceased of late years resided, and Alex. Campbell of the Educational Office, Charlottetown, all of whom survive her with the exception of late Mrs. Robert Sinclair. Deceased's parents were among the early settlers of this province, having emigrated from Aberdeen, Scotland, to Montague, whence after a short stay they went to Horton, Nova Scotia. Of the brothers and sisters of deceased all lived to be very old people, most of them having reached their 80th year. In early life she was brought to a saving knowledge of the truth and became a member of the Presbyterian Church. She was visited frequently during her illness, which was simply that of old age and infirmity, by Revs. A. D. McDonald, Jas. A. McDougall, D. McLean and all with a desire to converse with her respecting eternal things. She retained her faculties to the last with exception of sight and often astonished her visitors with her knowledge and memory of Scriptural truths as well as of other events. She was a woman of sterling qualities ever and always ready to extend a helping hand to friend or enemy. In her earlier years she was much among the sick. Being a skillful nurse in those days her services were much in requisition, which she cheerfully rendered without remuneration, and many are living today who can testify to her many good qualities of hand and heart in the hour of trouble and sorrow. She suffered no pain at any time, but passed peacefully away, trusting in the finished work of her Lord and Saviour. She longed to be away and be with the Lord which is far better and one of her favorite hymns was "The hour of my departure's come, I hear the voice that calls me home." Funeral took place Thursday to Argyle Shore Cemetery.
