Patterson, Montreal, and Mr. F. St. C. Harris, Supervisor of branches for the Maritime Provinces, arrived in Charlottetown on Saturday afternoon. They came to the island on Friday night and proceeded to Summerside and arrived in the city by special car attached to No. 4 at 2.30, p. m. They are making a tour of all the principal centres where the Royal Bank conducts business.

This is a magnificent showing and the Guardian gentlemen on their enterprise in taking the risk of sending their cattle and sheep to the exhibition, as well as on their success in capturing such a magnificent lot of prizes in the face of very keen competition. Both New Brunswick and Nova Scotia have splendid herds of cattle and they have recently gone in for sheep breeding on a very extensive scale. It is much to the credit of P.E. Mr. Colin Ramsay of Port Hill suffered a severe loss Saturday night when his barn and all his outbuildings with their contents were burned to the ground. The loss is estimated at \$6000 with only about \$400 insurance. Practically the whole seasons crop was in the buildings besides machinery, carriages, etc. Mr. Ramsay was in Summerside when the fire occurred but the neighbors gave what assistance they could. A man named Theodore Scott who, it is said, had made threats, was arrested last evening on suspicion of having set the fire and lodged in the Prince County Jail. He will appear before the stipendiary magistrate this morning.

That there should be no fall lobster fishing here—or at any rate until the end of September—is the opinion of Dr. Knight, chairman of the Biographical Board of Canada, who, accompanied by Mrs. Knight, is spending a few days in Charlottetown. Dr. Knight has been seven weeks investigating the lobster business. He has been searching for yearling and two-year-old lobsters for the purpose of trying to determine the approximate yearly yield and of ultimately establishing what the yearly catch should be without the danger of depleting the industry. The first point is to find the habitat of the yearling and two-year-old animals and having discovered it to devise means of catching them. Until last year exceedingly few yearling lobsters have ever been found. Somewhere in the sea in burrows and among the rocks they hide themselves so completely that many more than we were able to this summer, and the Fisheries Department is appealing to fishermen along the whole maritime coast to co-operate with the scientific workers in locating and catching these yearlings and two-year olds.

Dr. Knight views with considerable concern the large number of big lobsters that are being caught today along the south shore because for the first fortnight at least, the catch consists of large males and females that are the petunars of the lobster race in this locality. Towards the end of September particularly, many of the females are carrying eggs. At the beginning of September not so many, the eggs being within the body and therefore these females may be captured and canned at the time that we expect in the near future end of the month.
