### Marvellous Display at Jewelers Exhibition

The following report of the Jewelers' Convention held in Regina, beginning March 13, will be interesting reading to those who are interested in the jewelry trade. The exhibit was ably represented by Mr. L. E. Welner, of W. W. Welners, Ltd., of this city.

#### Marvellous Displays of Jewellery Thrown Open for Exhibition.

In the Hotel Saskatchewan yesterday afternoon following the official opening of the ninth annual convention of the Canadian Jewelers' Association, there were dealers, wholesale and retail, and jobbers and manufacturers—all jewelers—wandering from display to display, and never seeming to tire of the glorious exhibits through the 54 rooms of the hotel turned over to display purposes.

Silver ware, gold plate, window displays, glass and cut glass, novelties, rings, diamonds and a hundred other lines of the jewelry trade, all demanded attention at the same time.

The displays were thrown open to the trade at 2.30 yesterday afternoon, though the official opening came at 10 a.m. Tuesday morning, when over 240 delegates had registered from all parts of the Dominion. The general public will be permitted to view the displays this evening.

An outstanding part of one exhibit is a pearl beside a blister pearl, which is worthless in the oyster shell, and all in a specially prepared fluid.

#### Impressive Ring Display.

An altar in the Orange Blossom ring display of the Trinity Company, Walkerville, Ont., meets the eye immediately the room is entered, and in the small window display is the interior of a tiny model church, pews and all.

Another Canadian company, with a display of all Canadian made goods, was the McGlashen Clarke Company, of Niagara Falls, with a full line of silver and gold plate and flat ware.

Among the numerous other displays was that of the Goldsmith Company, with silver and flat ware; P. W. Ellis Company, with silver, sollet ware, china, novelties and watches; the exhibit of the New Haven Clock Company with a wide assortment of clocks and watches; Levy Brothers with watches, clocks, and rings; Holmes and Edwards, with a line of Canadian made articles, though the firm is controlled in the United States; Rowland and Campbell, with a wide range of watches, clocks, cut glass and ivory goods; and the Wahl Company with pens, pencils and desk sets.

#### Conditions Improving

When the convention opened yesterday morning, B. M. Chapman, first vice-president, occupied the chair in the absence of Walter J. Barr, Toronto, president. Conditions were rapidly improving in the Dominion, and what was of special importance to jewelers, people were buying a better class of goods, it was stated in Mr. Barr's address, which was read by Mr. Chapman.

O. M. Ross, secretary and treasurer, pointed out in his report that there had been a substantial increase in members during the year and also a decided increase in the amount of business handled at the head office. He reported that a bill to amend the gold and silver marking act had been approved by the Government and been given its first reading at Ottawa. Also that the department of customs had agreed to the request of the Association that all tourists returning from Europe will be required to sign a written declaration of purchases abroad in order to combat the smuggling evil.

Mr. Ross stated that a fund had been completed for the establishment of a scholarship in the Toronto Hortological School for the amount of \$50 per annum. He told the meeting that the jewelry trade had been in a depressed condition had agreed in case of seizure of articles of precious metals that these will not be sold at auction as according to former practice, but sent to the royal mint and melted. He directed the necessity of the appointment of a representative of the jewelry trade on the board of appraisers recently created by the Dominion government.

made to the Dominion government for a refund of the amount of excise tax on jewelry remaining unsold at the time of the removal of the tax. Also that steps had been taken to stop the importation, as far as possible, of low grade Swiss watches, by the imposition of a minimum specific duty. And that negotiations were in progress at Ottawa for the creation of a horological institute so that certificates of merit could be granted to efficient watch repairers. The secretary's report pointed out, too, that steps were being taken to secure legislation whereby the manufacturers of nationally advertised goods would be enabled to secure protection against having their products injured by the cutting of prices.

In conclusion, Mr. Ross paid tribute to the memory of the late M. C. Ellis, of Toronto, first president of the Association and one of its most earnest promoters.

The opening day of the Canadian Jewelers' Association's ninth annual convention concluded with a banquet and dance at the Hotel Saskatchewan last night. The dinner was of "pioneer" type and the easterners were served with the delicacies enjoyed by the pioneers of the Prairies though the meal was served in the large banquet hall of the Hotel Saskatchewan which was only comfortably large enough for the 450 visitors, instead of in a homesteader's prairie sod shack.

Potted buffalo meat and Indian pemmican were among the peculiar dishes on the menu, to which the easterners were strangers. Other items on the bill of fare were all of the western variety.

Sam Swayze led the singing for the gathering of jewelers and their associates. Hugh Bond and his sister, Ada Bond, gave exhibitions of Highland dancing and Neil Sutherland accompanied the dancers on the bagpipes.

A dance sketch was given by the Iris Sisters, by the courtesy of the Capitol Theatre.

A dance act, given by five pupils of Miss Edith Grant, evoked much applause.

The Ukrainian string orchestra gave a number of well received numbers, most of the orchestra being in Ukrainian costume. A. L. Wheatley, Regina, presided over the merry gathering, many present wearing colored caps and hats. Noise makers and balloons were everywhere to be seen and heard.

DR. J. T. M. ANDERSON NAMED AT SASK. CONSERVATIVE PARTY ELECTION.

SASKATOON, Sask., March 20.—Dr. J. T. M. Anderson, of Saskatoon, present leader of the Conservative group in the provincial Legislature, was elected leader of the Conservative Party of Saskatchewan at the provincial general convention of the party here.

Four other names were offered in nomination, but all withdrew. James Thomas-Milton Anderson was born in 1878 at Fairbank, Ont.

of Irish-Canadian parents. He was educated in the public school of Fairbank, the West Toronto High School and the Manitoba University, from which institution he emerged with the degrees of B.A., M.A., L.L.B., Silver Medalist in Classics. He was married in 1911 to Mary Redgwick, of Grenfell, Sask.

Dr. Anderson taught school in Saskatchewan for many years and for seven years was a school inspector. He was appointed director of education among new Canadians in the province in 1918 and had the office until 1922, when he was appointed to a school inspectorship, shortly afterwards resigning to enter politics as the leader of the Conservative Party of the province.

He was elected to the Saskatchewan Legislature as a Conservative member of Saskatoon in 1925. He was appointed leader of the party for the province in 1926, but resigned a year later, being re-appointed to-day. He has been House leader of his party in the Legislature since he was elected.
