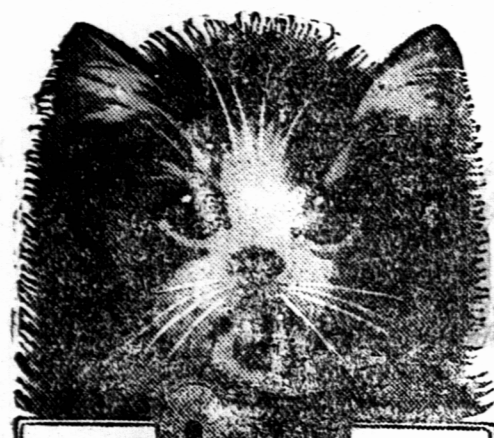

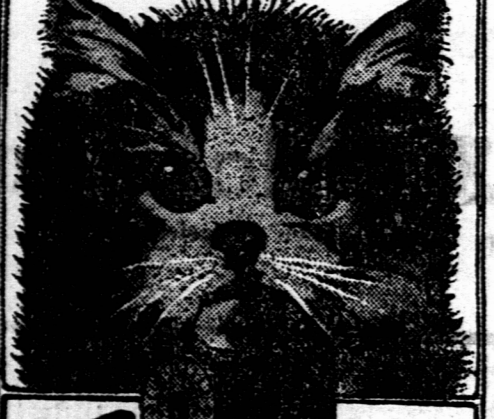

JOSEPH EXALTED.
Gen. 42. 33-49 Memory verses, 39-41

GOLDEN TEXT.
Them that honour me I will honour—
1 Sam. 2. 30.
OUTLINE.
1. Greater in Position, v. 38-45
2. Greater in Wisdom, v. 46-49.
LESSON HELPS.
30. "Pharaoh"—This is not the name of
the ruler, but the title, like the word em-
peror. "As God hath showed thee all
this"—This refers to his interpretation of
the dreams, which was that seven years
of famine would follow seven years of
plenty. Joseph ascribed his power to in-
terpret the dreams to God, and Pharaoh
said that this was so. "None so discre-
et and wise as thou art"—The proof of
this is seen in the advice which Joseph
gave to store up one fifth of the harvests
in the years of plenty so as to have food in
the years of famine. Such advice shows
true wisdom.

40. "Over my house"—That is, over the
court which I rule. "According unto thy
word"—This is, thy command. Only one
person in all Egypt should be a greater
ruler than Joseph, and that was
Pharaoh. It was a case of sudden ele-
vation to power, and if Joseph had not
indeed been wise his head would have
been turned. It was wise for Pharaoh,
however, to assert his own greatness, for
it is not best for a subject to be kin
while the king lives.
42. "Took off his ring . . . put it upon
Joseph's hand"—This was more than a
gift, it was a transfer of royal authority.
It was a signet ring, and the impression
of it on a document made it valid and
binding as by the ruler's command.
Valuable specimens of such rings are
found in some museums. "Vestures of
fine linen"—Such robes are worn by the
high priests of Egypt, and hence it would
seem that Joseph was thus enrolled in the
priestly class, which was of the highest
order.

43. "In the second chariot"—This means
the chariot second in splendour and
majesty to that which the king rode in.
He therefore was next to the king in
royal possession. "Bow the knee"—Not
as would seem a word of command to the
people, but a salutation like All hail!
44, 45. "No man lift up his head or foot"—
A strong figure of speech to show that
no word dare oppose him in any degree.
"Zaphnath-paaneath"—An Egyptian word
which means "bread of life," and certainly
an appropriate name for Joseph. "Priest
of On"—Or Heliopolis, the city of the
sun, because it was there that the sun
was an object of special worship. The
city was about two hours ride from Cairo,
and only a few ruins to mark the once
splendid city and temple.

"Thirty years old"—And hence Jos-
eph had been thirteen years in Egypt.
From a prison to a throne was a change,
and only a noble nature can have such
a sudden change of fortune and keep
humble. Joseph kept humble because he
saw the good hand of God in his affairs.
48. "He gathered up"—And laid up
food. In this we see the industry of
Joseph, for he went through all Egypt
and saw that his commands were obeyed.
We see also his prudence, for he pre-
pared for the coming years of famine;
and we see his power in the state, for
there must have been grumbling on the part
of those who did not think famine would
come, and who did not wish to pay such
taxes in food as were laid upon them.
To such persons the wisdom of Joseph
did not shine out clearly until the long
years of famine came. "The corn,"
which was "as the sand of the sea," was
laid up in treasure houses in the cities.
