DR. KOCH IN CANADA.

Robert Koch, the eminent discoverer of the tubercle bacillus having come over to America and being a very modest gentleman and too much pestered by the New York and Boston reporters took refuge in Canada. The reporters were not altogether at fault as a great many people, on whose behalf the interviewing reporters are seeking from time to time to tap the wisdom of the wise and great, desire to know what the renowned Dr. Koch thinks of the present methods of combating tuberculosis.

The Montreal Witness succeeded in getting the eminent scientist's opinion indirectly. Are we on the right track? Will sanatoria prove an effective weapon in the fight against consumption? To a certain extent we are on the right track, he thinks. Sanatoria are good institutions in their way but the ultimate triumph will not come by the multiplication of sanatoria, in Dr. Koch's opinion.

He points out that sanatoria will benefit certain localities, but the disease is not a local one. It is not merely national, but international. What then must be the next step forward? As to this, Dr. Koch hints at new discoveries in tuberculosis. Research work must go forward, and for this Mr. Carnegie has made a princely contribution. Bye and bye we shall know much more about tuberculosis than we now do and then we shall know better how to war against it.

Something like this has all along been in the minds of thinking people and has caused a hesitancy about establishing sanitary institutions. But this should not give pause to the work of educating the masses as to how tuberculosis is spread and what are the best preventative measures. All possible precautions should be taken to prevent the infection spreading. Disinfection of houses and rooms, a reasonable amount of isolation, the shutting out of tuberculous children from the schools—all these precautionary measures are rather enforced than rendered useless by what Dr. Koch has now laid down.

The excellent Canadian Courier, which we are glad to find has frequently a good word for the Tunnel, favors the union of the three Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland. It goes on to say that the leading men of the East are in favor of the scheme, though they hesitate about coming out boldly in favor of it. Are the leading men really in favor of maritime union? If they are, their hesitancy about advocating it is more apparent than their favor.

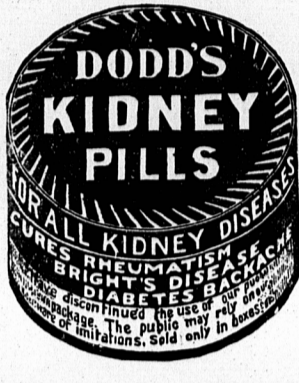
As to the bringing of Newfoundland to the Dominion, all would be delighted if it could be brought about. But that cannot be while Newfoundland out of the union prospers and progresses more than the Eastern Provinces that are in the union. And here you are.

When the exhibition was running in St. John last week the editor of the Times of that city was moved to react upon certain moral and personal exhibits. For instance, there was the man who slept in a doorway because he had no money to buy a bed. If he had the money he would have spent it in liquor, and still been bed-ridden. Another exhibit in St. John is the chain gang, made up principally of common drunks, who, unable to pay their fines, are sent out chained together to work on the roads and parks and so pay for their board and lodging in the jail. These are very painful exhibits and they are the fruits of the liquor traffic under the license system. The Times pertinently asks, "What shall we say of these exhibits? What should be said of the social system under which so many persons degenerate from the status of living souls to that of a mere gross appetite clothed in human form?"

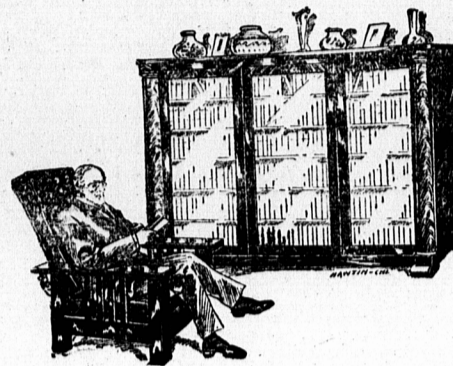

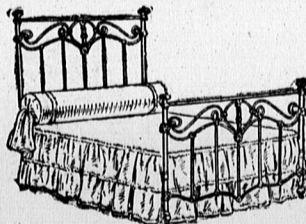

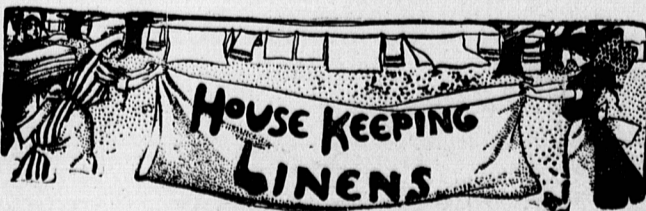
